Please excuse the loose style of the present letter. My time is entirely absorbed by the enormous broods of worms now fed in my cocconeries. But as soon as the silk crop is over, I will write to you to give you every useful information on

This day I have only time enough to advise you to discard the use of your paper cards, because it is impossible to scrape eafely the eggs from them.
