

Local and Other Matters.

FROM MONDAY'S DAILY, JULY 19.

Tabernacle Meeting.—Elder Orson Pratt preached yesterday afternoon.

The Rehearsal.—The rehearsal, at the New Tabernacle, for the coming Jubilee, was largely attended yesterday morning, not only by those who participated in the exercises, but also by spectators.

Splendid Shower.—That was a splendid soaking shower that fell on Saturday evening. It was accompanied by a pretty stiff "northwester." The crops are much refreshed.

Another Victim.—The body of another victim to foul air in the Davenport mine was brought to town to-day, and left at the Sexton's office, the second affair of the kind at the same place within a day or two. The funeral of deceased took place this afternoon.

Rowdyism.—Last evening a number of young men, who reside in the north-eastern part of the city, indulged in the silly and unmanly practice of tearing down a number of small signboards in the 14th Ward, and acting otherwise in an unseemly manner. They also went to a house in the same locality, where there is a lady lying very ill, and violently rang the bell. On the proprietor discovering them and remonstrating with them they retorted in an insolent manner. They were complained of, and the police went after them to-day.

Serious Shooting Affray at Bingham.—Bingham continues to sustain its reputation as being the champion field for scenes of blood and carnage. By special dispatch received from there this morning, we learn some particulars concerning a shooting affray that occurred there last evening.

Attorney Theodore Burmester, of this city, and James McManus quarrelled, in front of Clay's saloon, Bingham, at 7 p.m. yesterday, and during the altercation McManus fired at Burmester, the ball missing the latter and striking Michael Fagan, a disinterested party, in the breast. The bullet glanced, passed out and went through his left arm, fracturing it badly. Burmester then fired at McManus, but missed him.

McManus then retreated to the back room of the saloon, and Constable William Burmester, brother to Theodore Burmester, went in to arrest him. As the officer opened the door, McManus fired, hitting him in the region of the stomach, the bullet passing out through the hip. Constable Burmester fired twice, one shot striking McManus in the left breast, glancing and coming out at the left side. The other shot struck Michael Fagan in the calf of the right leg, the latter having walked into the saloon after having been shot outside.

At half-past ten o'clock this morning, when the dispatch was received, all of the three wounded men were doing well.

Departed This Life.—On Saturday, July 17th, at 12 o'clock, noon, Sister Emmeline Free Young, wife of President Brigham Young, departed this life at the residence of her son-in-law and daughter, Brother and Sister Nelson Empey.

The obsequies were conducted yesterday at the Beehive House, where a large number of the relatives of the deceased assembled on the occasion. The singing exercises were conducted by Brother C. J. Thomas and choir. Elder Geo. Goddard offered the opening prayer, when President D. H. Wells delivered an appropriate discourse; Elder Goddard spoke briefly, and was followed by President Young, whose remarks were of a most instructive and edifying character.

The closing prayer was offered by Bro. C. J. Thomas, when the remains of the departed were conveyed to President Young's private cemetery and laid in their last resting place, in presence of a large number of people who held the deceased lady in the highest esteem and affection.

Deceased was born in St. Clair County, Illinois, April 28th, 1826. She bore ten children to President Young, four sons and six daughters, nine of whom are now living, three sons and six daughters.

Deceased was blessed with many estimable qualities, which were retained for her the love and respect of those who had the pleasure of her acquaintance.
