THEATRICAL.—The play of "Ion" drew a very good house last night, on the occasion of Miss Ince's Benefit. It is classic and beautiful, but without anything stirring and impassioned to rouse the even flow of its incidents and events. Miss Ince played Ion with consummate grace and artistic power. The debut of Miss Emily Ince, as Cleonice, was very successful. She possesses the requisites of a fine actress, and may hope for a bright future, if she keeps the boards. Messrs McKenzie, Lindsay, Graham, and Margette were good in the characters committed to them.

To-morrow night the great tragedy of "Mary Stuart" will be repeated, and should draw a crowded house. It is a beautiful play, and excellently cast.

IN THE CITY.—Elder Jesse N. Smith arrived in the city yesterday evening, having left Parowan on Sunday afternoon. He remained at Beaver one day, and consequently made the distance about 250 miles, in three and a half traveling days. He is en route to Europe to fill a mission there to which he has been appointed; and the call to go upon it he has answered with this promptitude in person. We are pleased to greet Bro. Jesse. He informs us that the grasshoppers have not injured the wheat much, except to strip the leaves off, which will probably cause the wheat to shrink. They had been most severe on the oats and barley.

POLICE COURT.—This morning Hyron Cohn was accused by John H. Blizard of stealing a pistol the property of a colored man who had just vacated an apartment belonging to Mr. Blizard, when the wrath of the accused waxed hot and furious, and he charged on the said John, flourishing strong explosives. Cohn was brought before Alderman Clinton, charged with assaulting and abusing Blizard, and with profanity, which charges his Honor deemed fully proved, and fined him \$10 for disturbing the peace, and \$3 for profanity. There should be more fines on the latter charge.

FARMER'S CONVENTION.—By the Arizona News of the 11th ult., we learn that the farmers around Prescott, Arizona, being dissatisfied with the prices paid by Government contractors, met in council in Prescott, on the evening of the 4th of July, and a committee was appointed to draft resolutions and suggest a plan of action for mutual protection, when the meeting adjourned. Next evening they again met, and the committee reported a preamble and three resolutions, demanding a higher price for their products from contractors; desiring the co-operation of every farmer, merchant or other citizen, "who has his own, as well as the Territory's interest at heart, to assist in carrying out the intentions of the association," and submitting a copy of the following pledge to the farmers of Yavapai County for their signature: "We, the undersigned, by our respective signatures, do hereby bind ourselves, and pledge our honor, one to the other and each to the whole, that we will abide by the farmers' meeting or convention, to be held in Prescott, upon a day hereafter to be designated, and that we will use every honorable means in our power to carry out, in good faith, the intentions of the association." A committee was appointed to further the completion of the organization, with power to appoint such assistants, as might be necessary, to carry out the intentions of the association, and fix a time of holding the convention.

FOR HOME.—Elders Ephraim Green and Charles Boyden and families, from the Sandwich Islands Mission, arrived last night, after a six weeks' trip from Sacramento to this city. They came from the Sandwich Islands with Elder Alma L. Smith, whose arrival was noticed some time ago, but purchased and traveled with their own teams from California, while Elder Smith and family came by stage. They were accompanied by Bro. Geo. T. Wilson and family, from Australia, who arrived in California a year ago last April, and remained working in that State till he started with Elders Green and Boyden. During their journey from Sacramento to this city, they suffered from ill health, but they are now recovered, except one of Elder Boyden's children and Bro. Wilson, who still suffer.
