"Mr. Parr has something to say in regard to the releasing of the vessel Strathure in November, 1907, after he had selzed it. There is no information in any of the reports of the department tending to show any violation of the customs law by said vessel or master or owner.

"Mr. Parr makes the statement that in the summer of 1908 Mr. Bates, the regular examiner and expert of the department, was allowed to take part in the investigation in opposition to his (Part's) wishes. Whether this is true I do not know, as I was in Europe at the time, and had no connection with the alleged incident.

"This dispose of the specific charges of Mr. Parr. "As to any general implication that the office of the assistant secretary in charge of customs was somehow in langue with or under the influence of the sugar trust I can only assert most the sugar trust. I can only assert most positively that in the four years and a half of my tenure of this office I saw no indication that the said trust at-tempted to exercise such influence."
