Virginia City, Montana, 13.—Thermometer 20 above zero. Cloudy, with indications of snow.

Helena, Montana, 13.—1 p.m., thermometer 10 above zero. Cloudy. It has been snowing all the morning.

Memphis, 13.—The Commercial Bank suspended to-day. It is said the assets will exceed the liabilities. There was some excitement and runs made on other banks, but it soon allayed.

Vienna.—Dispatches from the south indicate that the Porte is about to pursue a more liberal policy on the eastern question. A decree has been issued guaranteeing the equality of rights in Candia, and the suspension of the collection of tithes for two years.

Senate.—Edmunds offered a resolution, which was adopted, instructing the Judiciary Committee to inquire into the expediency of reporting the law or rule, or the Senate rules and regulations in the procedure of a case of impeachment, and suspension of the officer under impeachment pending his trial.

Wilson introduced a bill providing for the gradual reduction of the army. He also reported back the bill prohibiting the restoration of officers cashiered by sentence of a court martial, without consent of the Senate.

A number of bills were introduced and referred.

Davis argued in favor of his resolutions, amending the constitution, to create a tribunal of one member from each State to decide on constitutional questions of jurisdiction between them and the United States.

An attempt was made to take up the anti-contract resolution, but failed.

The Senate went into executive session.

New York.—James Leverick, teller in the City Bank, has absconded with \$400,000. The standing of the Bank is not affected.

Richmond.—General Butler arrived to-night and was enthusiastically received by a large concourse of colored people and prominent Republicans.

House.—Wood offered a joint resolution, declaring the doctrine of the United States with reference to the recognition of the belligerent rights of hostile nations, which declares that whenever twelve months shall have elapsed without the renewal of hostilities the United States will consider the war ended, and renew relations of peace.

A large number of other bills and resolutions were introduced, under the call of States, including a resolution declaring the fourteenth article of the Constitution duly ratified.

The House resolved to continue the committee on the treatment of prisoners during the war with full powers.

Bingham offered a resolution that the rules be suspended, and the Reconstruction Committee be authorized to report now.

The House to-morrow will proceed to the consideration of the report; and at the close of the debate, on Wednesday, will proceed to vote on the same.

Adopted: yeas 44, yeas 116.

Bingham then reported the supplemental reconstruction bill, previously telegraphed.

Wilson, from the Judiciary Committee, reported back the Senate bill, with an amendment requiring the concurrence of two-thirds of the judges of the Supreme Court to decide a law of Congress unconstitutional.

Williams from Pennsylvania, moved to amend and require the decision to be unanimous. The question was discussed at great length, amid much excitement, finally the previous question was ordered and the bill passed.

Paris.—The *Moniteur* contradicts the rumors of popular disturbances at Naples; and assures its readers that perfect tranquility prevails in that city and surrounding provinces.

London.—Telegrams from Aden announce the arrival of Sir Robert Napier, who immediately left for Senape to

tion.

Warwick jail, where the Fenian prisoners are confined, is occupied by troops to prevent attempts of a rescue.

Dublin.—The papers found on the person of the prisoner Lannan are said to expose the whole plan of the Fenian leaders in their future operations in Ireland.

San Francisco, 13.—General Fred. Steele, State Commander of the Department of Columbia, died yesterday at San Mateo, of apoplexy. A snow storm on Saturday night covered the roofs of the houses and the streets. It is the heaviest fall that has been in the city since 1847.

Steamer China, for Yokohama, sailed to-day, with \$584,000 of treasure, \$205,000 of which was for Japan and the balance for China. Ships cleared for Liverpool: the *Brewster*, with 32,000 sacks of wheat; the *Birkby*, with 40,000 ditto; the *Wealth of the Nation*, with 22,000 ditto; for Rio Janeiro, the *Ruth*, with 4,000 barrels of flour; for Hong-kong, the *Endeavor*, with 750 barrels of flour; and Oregon Extra, 750.

Wheat quiet at \$2.60 @ 70.

Legal Tenders are 72 1/2.

The British bark *Oliver Cutts* was wrecked last night on the Paul Ray rock, near Aleatraz Island, while coming up to the harbor. She was laden with coal from Narimo, Vancouver Island. There are no hopes of saving the cargo or vessel.

Paris, 13.—General Failey, Commander of the expeditionary corps, has asked the Emperor to permit the return of the French troops to Rome, the quarters at Civita Vecchia and Viterbo being overcrowded. This ominous request creates a general feeling of uneasiness and distrust.

Washington, 13.—The Senate has been in executive session for five hours, debating the resolution for not sustaining the President's suspension of Stanton. The resolution passed by 35 to 6. The Senate removed the injunction from the Secretary, and also ordered a certified copy of the resolutions to be transmitted to the President, Grant and Stanton.

Columbus.—The Democratic caucus nominated Thurman as Senator on the first ballot. He will be elected to-morrow. The vote stood, Thurman 51, Vallandigham 24.
