of justice. Three resolutions bearing upon this subject, introduced in the house yes-terday, were referred to the committee on rules. Mr. Campbell assured Mr Wickersham that there was no desire on the part of himself or other mem-bers to interfere with the work of the executive departments. Mr. Campbell said he intended to have a conference with the committee on rules in regard to his resolution to ascertain pros-pects for an inquiry.
