At 12:50 p. m. the Connecticut en-tered the harbor and was soluted from the naval station, and at 1:28 p. m. she, followed by the other ships, rounded the lighthouse buoy and all came to anchor inside the harbor, while the pentup enthusiasm of the islanders found vent in whistling sirens and the bursting of daylight fireworks.
