IN RELATION TO BILLIARD AND OTHER TABLES.

SEC. 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, That no person shall keep any of the tables hereinafter mentioned, the tables hereinafter mentioned, in any hotel, saloon or other public place, for use, without first obtaining a license therefor according to the provisions of this ordinance.
