

WINNING TEAM
IS NOW EXPECTED

Members of Olympic Committee
Are Jubilant Over
Try Outs.

MORE MONEY IS REQUIRED.

Sullivan Wants to Send Every Athlete
Who Has a Chance to Land a
Winning Point.

New York, May 14.—Following the Pacific coast tryouts which were held Saturday afternoon at Stanford university, in California, members of the Olympic committee are jubilant over the fact that everything now points to a winning team to represent the United States in London in July.

The only thing that is worrying us now, said James E. Sullivan, secretary of the committee, is the picking of the team. Every one is having problems. Within the past month reports have been received from all over the country stating that some athletes have been breaking world records in practice. If these reports are true there will be many upsets on June 1, there will be enough men to send every athlete who has a chance of gaining a point.

While reports of wonderful feats have been received here, experts who have seen thousands of these reports before, claim it will be the seasoned champions who will perform best and win out when the proper time comes.

They say they cannot see how such men as Shaw of Dartmouth, and Forrest Smithson are going to lose in the high hurdles. Martin Sheridan with the discus, Melvin Sheppard in the middle distance, McShane and Flanagan in the weight events, Glanier in the quarter mile, Dray of Yale in the pole vault, Porter in the high jump, Ray Ewry in the standing jump, Bellows and Bonag in the distance runs, Dan Kelly in the broad jump, James Sullivan in the mile run, and those in the other events and Garrels in any of the specialties he trains for and competes in.

All of these have consistently and persistently shown form that stands out by itself and trainers claim nothing less than serious accidents can prevent them from making the team.

WELL REPRESENTED.

In the Marathon race America is by no means left in the lurch. Within the past year this country has developed long distance runners that are by no means below the average of the world. We have a good chance of capturing that event this year.

Up to yesterday more than \$11,000 had been subscribed to carry the team abroad and Mr. Sullivan expects to have at least \$15,000 by June 15. Judging that it will cost each man \$300 to \$325 for expenses from the time he leaves New York this amount will enable the committee to pay from \$40 to \$50 to each man.

With this number every member of the committee is sanguine of success. The committee has decided to hold the tryouts on May 25 and 27. In all probability these tryouts will only take one night as the fact that only natural born or fully naturalized citizens of America are eligible will keep a number of entries away.

officially directed physical training under the methods developed by the Y. M. C. A., and colleges of America, has just been opened in St. Petersburg. It has immediately sprung into popularity and the Russians are heartily taking to it. Instead of the heavy apparatus work in vogue throughout Europe, this is a physical department, including gymnastic with running track and an extensive system of baths and dressing rooms, all directed by a religious organization as a part of its man-developing system. The gymnasium was erected and equipped at the expense of James Stokes of New York city, who established the association and purchased the main building several years ago. The association already has a membership exceeding 1,500 and the minister of finance has notified its treasurer that a gift of 5,000 roubles would be forthcoming annually from the government for its support. Business houses have contributed to its maintenance, so that 35,000 roubles each year are at its disposal. The club has been so much improved with service of the association in Russia that he has made personal acquaintance of his appreciation to Mr. Stokes, its founder.

GANS STRONG FAVORITE.
