## OBITUARY.

The funeral services of Mr. JOHN HITE SHARP took place yesterday from the residence of his brother William, with whom he has made his home since coming to Utah Territory, over a year ago.

The cause of his immediate death resulted from slipping and falling on the sidewalk in front of the "Old Constitution Building," as he was returning home between seven and eight o'clock on Monday evening. He was immediately carried home and lingered until 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Sharp was one of a company of emigrants who passed through Utah in 1849 for the gold mines of California.

At the request of his brother William, Counselor Daniel H. Wells, after singing and prayer, delivered over his remains, a most impressive and feeling address, replete with instruction that not only affected the living, but also showed wherein the dead could receive benefit through the ordinances of the gospel of the Son of God, as had been revealed through the Prophet Joseph Smith and that all mankind who had departed and who had not committed the "unpardonable sin" could obtain salvation in the kingdom of God, by and through the blessings that our Heavenly Father had bestowed upon his children in these days, the dispensation of the fullness of times.

The remains of Mr. Sharp were consigned to their last resting place in the Salt Lake City cemetery in the lot of his brother William, who with his families and friends, as also his brother Robert, who arrived during the services, followed him to his place of rest.
