A COLLIERY EXPLOSION

Chraleston, W. Va., Jan. 30.—Nine miners met death in the New River col-liery, known to miners as the Lower Rone mine, 45 miles from here, near Hawk's Nest, this afternoon, in an ex-plosion that partly wreeked the mine. Twenty-five men were in the mine at the time of the explosion, and eight of the nine dead were instantly killed The other 16 escaped with only slight injuries. injuries, At midnight seven of the dead had been identified. They are:

Wilbur Wilson. Gradison Coles. Charles Workman, William Hoffmaa.

One of the bodies was thrown out of the mine and into a tree several yards distant. This is one of the bodies that has not been identified. The other is badly routilated
