Telegrams show that the recent carthquake affected the Danube basin from Passou in Bavaria to Preburg in Hungary. The shock was felt at Wiltengan, in Bohemia, Schelctain in Moravia, Budrais, Trebitsch, Tischnawitz, and Prerrau, and elsewhere to the north, and the limits marked by Odenburg, Kindburg, and the Noriz Alps. The centre movement was at Schirbbes, where there were three shocks, lasting ten seconds. Rents are visible in numerous houses in Vienna. Several chimueys have fallen. The river Danube receded from the right bank and passed in a great wave to the other side.
