Dealers Say the Drop is Due to an Annual Disturbance.

Dealers here state that the recent fall in the price of sugar will have but little effect here, as stores generally had but little on hand and in Ogden the supply was entirely cleaned out. The lurry was due to the annual trouble he coast that always occurs when the alifornia beet sugar comes in compeition with cane-the product of the Western Refinery-better known as the Western Sugar Trust. The drop on the coast has amounted to 50c a hundred in the last week, which brings the price to \$4.90 in San Francisco, or addng the 75 cents freight rate, to 5.65 in Salt Lake. Sugar is quoted here today at \$6.05 retail and \$5.90 wholesale
