Korean Rebellion.

Lives of Foreigners Unsafe and Sixteen Gunboats in the Harbor of Chemulpo.

The Country Flooded With Chinese and Japanese Soldiers and a Possible War Between the Two Nations—The Navy of Japan and the Wonderful Efficiency of the Chinese—A Visit to a Naval School at Peking and the Great Gun Works at Han Yang—The North China Squadron and the Possibilities of Conflict and For China—Peking Rights in China—Grey's Telegraph—How the Agent of the Marine Gun Has Taken to a Visit in a Chinese Man-of-War and a Chat With the Captain—The Chinese and Dynasts.

The king's forces are already left for the Korean shores, and it is said that there are sixteen men-of-war in the harbor of Chemulpo. The Russians and the English are sending their ships to Korea, and the flagships of our Asiatic squadron, the Baltimore, has already arrived. Admiral Scurry is in command, and the American colony, in case the city of Seoul is bombarded, will be taken to the sea coast and put upon this ship for protection. It is said to be the condition of Korea. The lower classes are little less than slaves. They have been oppressed by the nobles, and the execution of the government officials during the last two years have been so great that many of the natives are starving. An unsettled condition prevails throughout the whole peninsula, but the revolutionaries at its worst at the south. Here a revolutionary party have taken up arms against the government. They have massacred many of the officials and they have twice defeated the soldiers of the king. Their numbers have

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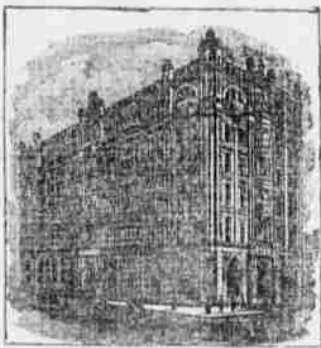
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
