fatal fight this morning, at the state prison between Convicts E. W. Hamilton and William Brown. The facts as nearly as could be ascertained this noon are as follows: The two men had a disagreement yesterday afternoon from which bad blood sprang, and culminated this morning, at 7 oclock, when the men turned out with their buckets They were close together when the ouarrel was renewed, and Hamilton struck Brown suddenly over the head several times with an iron bar about 18 inches long by two inches wide and onefourth of an inch thick. Brown's agility in attempting to dodge the blows alone saved his life. Then Brown either ran back into his cell and secured a knife he had concealed there, or had it at the time concealed in his clothes. With this weapon he attacked Hamilton, cutting him through the lips, knocking out sev-eral teeth and badly cutting the tongue.

Hamilton returned with the bar, beat

ing Brown savagely about the head. Brown continued to defend himself, and

By that time, both men were bleeding profusely and in a state of collapse The guards were promptly on the scene, but the two desperadoes got in their work so quickly that the combat could be reckoned in seconds. Dr. A Young, the prison physician, was immediately summoned, and under his direction the men were carried on blankets to the hospital, where their wounds were attended to. Their recovery is doubtful, as Brown is so terribly beaten about the head that fatal concussion of the brain is likely to ensue; and the slash through Hamilton's lung leaves
