Humboldt is to have a monument in New York.

Another woman's suffrage organ is to be started in Chicago under the name of the *New Era*.
A girl in Paris, who has neither arms nor legs, sews very nicely, embroiders, and writes with her lips and teeth.
Some excitement has been caused in London by the discovery that three girls, aged 13, 15 and 17, have been imprisoned for debt.
The highest permanent human habitation on the surface of the globe is the Buddhist monastery of Haule, in Tibet, at a height of 15,117 feet above the sea.
The longest artillery range on record, namely, 10,300 yards, was lately attained in England, by a 5-inch muzzle loader gun of fourteen tons, firing a shot of 50 lbs., with a charge of 50 lbs.

A Jesuit schoolmaster in the south of France, having adopted a novel mode of punishing his pupils by hanging them head downwards, from a hook, has been brought before the Departmental Council of Public Instruction, which could devise no fitter punishment for such atrocious cruelty than suspending him—not head downwards, but from his function as a teacher for two years; and his superior in office, another Jesuit, the director of the school, has positively been reprimanded for permitting such conduct. Would laymen have got off so easily? We venture to think not.—*Ex.*

A negro man named Bob Kline who has been employed as a servant at Mrs. Perry's, Arapahoe street, was discovered, a few nights since, in an attempt to enter the apartment of a lady residing there. The lady providentially had a navy pistol laying handy,—it unfortunately missed fire,—but a smart rap on the head taught the rascal that he had made a mistake and he beat a hasty retreat. He is now to jail awaiting an examination. Whether his intent was to rob or commit some more heinous crime, he is deserving of severe punishment.—*Colorado (Denver) Tribune.*

A singular instance of the absurdities of charitable bequests is furnished in London, where some hundred years ago some good old soul left a house and garden in the city as a perpetual maintenance for three poor women and a cat. The property is now worth £40,000 a year. Three poor women and their cat, friends of the trustees, are maintained, and the rest of the income, £39,650 per annum is expended in salaries on uncles, aunts, cousins, appointed as secretaries, treasurers, chaplains, visitors, etc., who see to the proper distribution of alms, catechise the old women, and stroke the cat.

Egypt is moving in the path of progress. The Viceroy is not contented with giving parliamentary institutions to his subjects. He makes a still greater innovation on the customs: He affords them the right of the wives of his harem going about in their carriages and in the public streets, dressed in Parisian costume, and with only a thin silk gauze to veil their faces. Day after day he takes his rides and his walks in their company, in the most frequented places and without any escorts in their train. They give their own orders, and use their own black eyes and show their own pale faces with almost as much freedom as an American or English lady. What is more, the Viceroy means to have his Pachas do the same.

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
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
