Precipitation since the first of the month, 1.51 inch, which is .30 inch above the normal. Excess in precipitation since Jan. 1, 2.35 inches.

The barometer is highest over the north Pacific states, Montreal and upper Mississippi valley, central Gulf and extreme northwest; and lowest over the middle plateau and lake region. Precipitation occurred principally over portions of Oregon, Washington, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas. The temperature changes were slight except a fall of 10 or more degrees over portions of Utah and Idaho and a corresponding rise over New Mexico and North Dakota.

LOCAL BRIEFS.

Jonathan Rae has sold his Shire colt Governor Will, to J. W. Valentine and J. F. Hanson of Brigham City for \$1,600.

Louisa Smith, who was badly injured recently in the Highland Boy mine, is recovering at the Keogh-Wright hospital. One eye has been removed, but the other will be saved.

The ladies of the Christian church are being entertained this afternoon at the residence of Mrs. L. A. Mehse, 537 South Fifth East. Mrs. W. H. Lepper is assisting Mrs. Mehse.

E. C. Wheatley, R. W. Baty and Lew. Jensen have bought the Hackney stallion Venture II for \$1,000. M. A. Garas of Fielding has bought the imported Clydesdale stallion Field Marshal for \$1,200.

John Hoorley of Bingham, aged 8, played yesterday with a giant cap, and was brought up to the Keogh-Wright hospital later with a mangled hand. It was necessary to amputate the thumb and two fingers.

Persy A. Montgomery of Washington, D. C., special agent of the immigration bureau, is in the city, enroute to southern Nevada, tracing up immigrants, and is also acting as correspondent for eastern periodicals.

Dog poisoners are abroad in Provo, Ogden and Salt Lake, their attentions being given to valuable animals. Among the Salt Lake citizens who have lost valuable dogs are Samuel Newhouse and Robert Harkness, the animals having been given meat containing strychnine.

Gov. Wells has honored the regulation papers of the governor of Iowa for the return to that state of Don Hoaglin, who is wanted at Mt. Pleasant, Ia., on the charge of assault with intent to commit robbery. Sheriff R. C. Campbell of Mt. Pleasant came after the prisoner, and left today for his home.

Clayton was convicted of getting away with \$537 on one count, and there are two other counts to be brought up at the next session of court. The accused made good the money he took.

PAVING BALANCE TO BE REFUNDED.

Council Takes Steps to Return Excess Assessment to South Temple Property Owners.

STOCKBROKERS TO PAY LICENSE

Fernstrom's Ordinance to That End Was Passed by the City Council Last Night.

At the adjourned session of the council last night, steps were taken to refund to the abutting property owners on west South Temple street, in accordance with the petition of Joseph P. Smith et al, the sum of about \$10,000, which was collected by the city above the amount needed for the paving of the street.

The municipal laws committee recommended that the city auditor and the city engineer report to the council the amount of money now in the special fund for the paving of west South Temple street over and above the actual cost of the work, and which is ready to be refunded to the abutting property owners on that street. The amount in the fund is \$14,584.43, but of that amount \$4,750 is being held to await the result of the suit brought by the paving company against the city to recover that amount which was imposed as a penalty upon the company for failure to complete the work within contract time. Not including that amount, there is something over \$10,000 ready to be refunded. At the present time, the report of the committee was adopted, and as soon as the reports are received from the two officials the money will be refunded.

MORE WIRES.

Hartenstein's resolution was adopted requiring Alan L. Lovey to execute a bond in the sum of \$5,000 to indemnify the city against all damages that may be done by reason of the messenger wire being strung through the city by him, pursuant to a resolution granting him that privilege passed by the council a week ago.

JAMES SHARP REMEMBERED.

The following resolution, introduced by Hartenstein, was adopted by the council by unanimous vote:

Whereas, Death has removed from our midst James Sharp, an upright, honest and useful citizen of this community, and formerly mayor of this city;

Therefore be it Resolved, by the city council of Salt Lake City, that the city council extend its sympathy and condolence to the bereaved family and relatives of said James Sharp, and that this resolution be entered upon the records of the city.

Fernstrom's ordinance, defining and placing a license of \$25 per annum on each stockbroker in the city, was passed by the council.

The committee on claims denied the claim of Christopher Little for \$350 for a dog which was taken by the dog catcher by mistake and cremated.

Upon the recommendation of the first department committee, the council denied the petition of the San Pedro road asking permission to store oil and gasoline in a building at Third North and Fourth West streets.

Agricultural Superintendent Geo. Austin Reports Promising Outlook.

Agricultural Superintendent George Austin of the Utah Sugar company has returned from a state business trip, and reports the outlook as very promising for this year's beet crop. Quite a force of Japanese are working in the River district, thinning beets. Mr. Austin says the cutting station at Spanish Fork will be ready for operation next September.

C. O. Townsend of the department of agriculture at Washington has written Mr. Austin to notify him when the mother beet begins to flower, and then an expert will be sent on to take observations. Mr. Austin says the Idaho outlook is also promising.

OUTING AT LAGOON.

High School Cadets Preparing for Their First Annual Encampment.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the coming encampment of the High School cadets. This is the first to be held by this organization, and gives fair promise of being an entire success.
