UTAH COUNTRY LIFE TO BE INVESTIGATED

Commission Will Arrive Here Tomorrow Afternoon, Leaving Friday For Denver.

The commission on country life will arrive in this city from the west over the Short Line at 3:05 tomorrow, and leave for Denver over the Union Pacific Friday noon. The personnel of the party is Prof. L. H. Bailey, chairman, New York; Henry Wallace, Iowa; Kenyon L. Butterfield, Massachusetts; Walcott, Page, North Carolina; Gilbert Pinchot, U. S. Forester; E. W. Allen, executive secretary. The party is in charge of C. J. Blanchard, statistician, U. S. reclamation service.

Three meetings are scheduled to be held during the commission's stay here. All will be held in the office of Governor John C. Cutler, the first at 10 a. m., the second at 2 p. m., and the third at 8 p. m. In the forenoon it is expected that a number of leading farmers will be in attendance, and subjects to be discussed will pertain more or less to rural affairs, such as farm sanitation, roads, rural fire delivery, parcels post, mail service, transportation, farmers' institutes, etc.

To second meeting is designed for business and professional men, ministers and others, while at the evening session there will be present state officials.

Announcement has been made by Dean Bailey, who is one of the leaders of the commission, that the meetings will be devoted to informal discussion rather than to the making of set speeches. Mr. Bailey is from the agricultural department of Cornell university. Henry Wallace is editor of Wallace's Farmer, sold in England, is from the Massachusetts Agricultural College, Mr. Pinchot, as is well known, is chief of the U. S. forest service, and Mr. Page is from New York. The meetings were arranged for by Governor Cutler and by J. A. Whitson, president of the Agricultural college of Utah.

FITZGERALD TELLS HOW HE OUTWITTED POLICE

They Thought He Was a Clerk in the Pueblo Railway Yards Office.

W. H. Fitzgerald is in New York. He is the man whom the sheriff of Amarillo, Texas, is looking for to take him back to that place on a charge of embezzlement.

That Fitzgerald is a smooth member there can be no doubt. He was arrested a few weeks ago in town for passing a few worthless checks in Texas. When arrested he displayed great amazement at first, and said that the officers were playing a joke on him. His arrest was made at the request of J. A. Hughes, sheriff of Amarillo, Texas, who told the local police to hold him until he arrived on the scene. This the police did and he was delivered over to the sheriff from the south with a breath of satisfaction. The sheriff, while on his way with the prisoner to Texas, happened to loose sight of Mr. Fitzgerald, who took his leave of the law through a window of a fast flying train near Pueblo. He had not been heard of since his escape until this morning, when it was found that he had ridden from the east to a man named Mcadden, who evidently helped him to escape.

The letter is dated Pittsburgh, Nov. 25, and is signed W. H. Fitzgerald. It reads: "Well you see I made it all right. Not an officer accosted me after they broke into the Switch Shanty on me in the Pueblo yards while I was changing my clothes. I dropped down at a desk and told the officers I had seen no one, everything and the suit you had waiting in the yards was a perfect fit. Used the Burlington out of Denver and am now leaving Pittsburgh on the Pennsylvania special. I will send you a check as soon as I reach New York."

Mcadden is now waiting for the check. Hughes, the sheriff, will probably draw down his offer of a reward now that Fitz is on the Great White Way.
