is the man whom the sheriff of Amarillo, Texas, is looking for to take him back to that place on a charge of embezzlement.

That Fitzgerald is a smooth member there can be no doubt. He was arrested a few weeks ago in town for passing a few worthless checks in Texas. When arrested he displayed great amazement at first, and assumed that the officers were playing a joke on him. His arrest was made at the pagent of J A which are being of Amarillo, Texas, who told the local police to hold him until he arrived on poince to hold him until he arrived on the scene. This the police did and he was delivered over to the sheriff from the south with a breath of satisfaction.
