

TRADE CONDITIONS HAVE IMPROVED

Cities Where Financial Stress
Most Severe Are Getting
More Currency.

RESTRICTIONS BEING LIFTED.

Notable Retrenchment in All Di-
rections With Tendency to Cutting
Down Production.

New York, Nov. 21.—A considerable im-
provement in financial conditions is
indicated in reports from various
centers in the United States which have
been received by R. G. Dun & Co. Some
of the cities where the financial stringency
was most severely felt a week
ago have a steadily increasing supply
of currency, and as a result business in
general is in a more satisfactory state.
The increase in currency supply at
Minneapolis has made it possible for
the large elevator concerns to resume
the purchase of grain, and as a result
trade in assuming normal proportions.
Collections are moving more freely and
the disturbance in money markets are
parently has passed. The restriction
governing deposits in Cleveland savings
banks is to be lifted. At Boston com-
mercial and industrial conditions are
hopeful. There is a noticeable retrenchment
in all directions, and a ten-
dency toward curbing production
and a slowing down of manufac-
turing plants.

Boston, Cincinnati, Baltimore, Cleve-
land and some other cities report good
retail business. Although the currency
supply is much larger than a week ago
in Philadelphia, the financial stringency
restrains activity in the wool market.
Cloak and suit manufacturers and job-
bers of woolen and wholesale dry goods
houses are not so depressed in demand.
In some of the lighter lines conditions are
better normal.
At Portland, Ore., the reaction in
wholesale and retail trade as a result
of the financial stringency which caused the
suspension of two Portland banks, was
not so great as was feared. The stringency
in the money market, however,
stopped business in grain and hops,
and has checked real estate buying and
important building operations. But
wheat buying is now resumed on a
moderate scale, and is expected to at-
tain large proportions as soon as more
cash is available, as there has been a
heavy tonnage engaged, for which car-
goes must be provided.

Oats are going into consumption rapidly,
and only a trifling proportion of the
barley crop remains unsold.
Inability to supply currency needs at
St. Paul still interferes with the mar-
keting of farm products, and collec-
tions are below the normal. Buyers
are more conservative, but there are
few cancellations, and jobbing trade
holds up well.

BRYAN'S LATEST FINANCIAL PLAN

Would Have Congress Pass Law
For Government Guarantee
Of National Banks.

WOULD SECURE DEPOSITORS.

Could Go Into Effect Immediately, Re-
storing Confidence and
Aiding Business.

Washington, Nov. 21.—William J.
Bryan arrived here today and attend-
ed the wedding of the daughter of a
friend, Cutler F. Budd. He held a
conference with several other friends.

To reporters Mr. Bryan said:

"The administration is prepared, so
we are informed, to recommend a
postal savings bank. While this would
doubtless encourage deposits, and while
those deposits could in turn be hand-
led over to the banks, it does not furnish
complete relief, because the plan as
presented limits deposits and does not
contemplate the opening of circulating
accounts. The business community,
therefore, cannot use the postal savings
banks to any great extent, and, be-
sides, it would take some time to in-
augurate a postal savings system and
secure the necessary number of em-
ployees to make the plan effective
throughout the country."

"I believe it is possible for the gov-
ernment to give immediate relief by
an act of Congress providing for the
guarantee by the government of all
national banks, the banks thus guaran-
teed to agree to reimburse the govern-
ment for any losses incurred and to
make this reimbursement in proportion
to their deposits. The advantage of
this plan is:

"First, that every depositor in such
guaranteed bank will feel secure.

"Second, the expense of it will be
paid by the banks which get the benefit
of it, and this expense will be small
compared with the benefit gained.

"Third, it can be put into effect im-
mediately, thus restoring confidence
and enabling business to be resumed.

"It is probable that all the national
banks would be willing to take advan-
tage of this guarantee, because the
additional security given to their de-
positors would be of great advantage
to the banks. During 40 years li-
ability would have ample security in
the capital surplus of the banks
which would voluntarily join in the
plan. As each bank will become inter-
ested in the proper management of
every other guaranteed bank, it would
be easier to secure the legislation nec-
essary for the correction of such
abuses as exist and for the better
management of the banks—for in-
stance, legislation preventing over-
borrowing by directors and officials of
the bank, and legislation preventing
speculation by officials.

"It seems to me that the plan sug-
gested ought to be acceptable to the
depositors, all of whom desire securi-
ty; and it ought to be acceptable to the
banks, who will be well paid by the
increased deposits for any tax that
may be collected from them to reim-
burse for the expense, and I don't see
where any objection can be made to

the use of the government as a guar-
antee when it is simply protected from
loss. The only objection that occurs to
me is that state banks might be less
attractive to depositors if national
banks are guaranteed. But there are
two answers to this objection. In the
first place, state banks are likely to
suffer if this financial stringency con-
tinues, and they are therefore inter-
ested in restoring confidence. In the
second place, there is no reason why
state banks should not be protected by
a similar system under which the
state would guarantee depositors in
state banks and collect the expense
from the state banks guaranteed."

Chicago, Nov. 22.—Six young women
stenographers employed by the Ameri-
can Steel & Wire company, had a

of their superior. Yesterday six of
the young women conceived a variation

left the door partly closed.
Just when the chorus was rolling
forth in reverberating volume little
Willie Osterfelt, the office boy, slipped
up to the vault, hinged the door shut,
and gave the combination knob a whirl.
The song of the imprudent sextet
died away in a shriek while six pairs
of feminine hands beat on the iron
door. The other young women sten-
ographers spring to the rescue and
Willie hastily decamped.
The vault was airtight and none of
the girls knew the combination—in-
fact, it was known only to A. P. Pratt,
head of the filing department, and he
was at lunch. One red-headed young
woman, however, found the handle
and rushed him to the spot with pleas-
ure and crowbar. A hole was soon made
in the vault wall, through which the
peasants rushed out. They said they
