BISHOP WHITNEY'S ADDRESS.

Bishop Orson F. Whitney was the next speaker. He said the remarks of the previous speaker had brought viv-idly to his mind two passages if Scrip-ture. One was "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to veryone that believeth." The othe was, "If there is anything virtuous lovely or of good report or praise worthy, we seek after these things." The Later-day Saints, said th The other speaker, were a purity-loving people. Their religion comprehended all that was good, and noble and true. It was good, and noble and true. It taught its adherents to live lives of righteousness. It taught them that man was a dual character, temporal and spiritual; that he was subject to two powers, good and evil. It pro-claimed the personality of God and of his Only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ; that man was made in the image of the Father, and that as Christ rose from the tomb, so also should all men arise whe nite trump should sound and call the tono, so also should all then arise whe nike trump should sound and call them forth from their graves. The Latter-day Saints believed in a literal resurrection of the body; they believed that the Spirit of God would not dwell in unclean tabernacles, and that it was therefore necessary to lay aside all filthy, debasing, soul destroying habits in order to please God.
