A Forgery.

MEMPHIS, 2.—A forger, calling himself J. H. Tomstock, recently obtained a three thousand dollar draft on the Louisiana National Bank, New Orleans, and a letter of identification. He will probably turn up in some other city. The letter was obtained on a forged note from Nashville.

A Protest.

BALTIMORE, 2.—There was a mass meeting of the Democratic Central party of the city to-night, in Monument square, to protest against the proceedings in South Carolina under the auspices of the white robes corps. Clubs of the various wards paraded, and Reverdy Johnson was president. Resolutions were adopted, and addresses delivered by Johnson, Pinkney White, Joshua A. Van Sandt, and others.

**ILLINOIS.**  
About Troops.

CHICAGO, 2.—A Springfield, Ill., special says the report from Washington that a part of the eighth U. S. infantry has been ordered here is not credited in official circles, as Governor Palmer has made no requisition on the secretary of war for troops, and it is not believed they would be sent except upon his request. It is said here that the troops were simply ordered here to go into barracks for the winter, without any reference to their use here in any way.

**PACIFIC COAST DISPATCHES.**  
California.

SAN FRANCISCO, 2.—Between \$30,000 and \$40,000 in coin was found in the vault of John Sime's bank by the sheriff, and the special deposits were all safe.

The election of the Young Men's Republican club, which was a very noisy and almost riotous affair, resulted in a mixed ticket.

John E. Tyler, the gambler who fired a pistol in the crowd in front of the Alhambra theatre, was shot to-day. In the Brodick will case of John Kelley et al. against John A. McGlynn et al., the defendant having obtained a final verdict in his favor, took out a judgment for costs, and today sold all the plaintiff's supposed interest in the block bounded by Harrison, Spear, Fulton and Stewart Sts., valued at \$250,000, a part of the estate, for \$600.

The failure of John Sime & Co. did not produce the slightest run upon any of the banks, and the excitement, beyond the immediate depositors, is all over. It is rumored that one of the partners, who is worth a million dollars, drew out of the firm some three months since, but no notice was given to the public of the fact, which makes him responsible for the entire debt of the concern. Many of the depositors hope to receive dollar for dollar on their demands.

Edward Kahoe, a native of New York, a restaurant man, was killed by the accidental discharge of his pistol, which he was cleaning, last evening. Mrs. Oliver, residing on Union street, near Fillmore, was dangerously, if not fatally, injured by a shot from the same hair or just catching fire from a candle. It is feared she cannot recover.

**FOREIGN NEWS.**  
GREAT BRITAIN.

Commercial Treaty.  
LONDON, 2.—A compromise has been arrived at between the French and English governments with regard to the commercial treaty. The notice of abrogation given by France has been withdrawn and the treaty is to be continued in force, but with material modifications, the details of which have already been agreed upon.

**FRANCE.**  
Appreciation of Minister Washburne.

PARIS, 2.—A deputation of American residents to-day presented Minister Washburne with a resolution of appreciation of his services to his countrymen during the siege and under the Commune.

**PRUSSIA.**  
General Strike Likely.

BERLIN, 2.—The workmen's committee of this city has summoned a congress of workmen to meet on the 19th. The business of this meeting is to organize a general strike for the reduction of the daily labor to nine hours, and for a general increase of wages.

**NEW DODGE TO RAISE THE WIND.**

on the gentle frauds, compelling them to flee to their own quarters, where they have, doubtless, by this time, made up a very respectable amount by subscribing to their own lists.—St. Louis Times.
