The capital is set down at \$100,000.00.

Attestation of incorporation of the Salt Crystal Salt company have been filed with the county clerk. The business of the corporation will be the carrying on of a general merchandising business, and to deal in salt of all grades, also to purchase and work saline lands, to erect and operate mills, and generally to carry on a salt manufacturing business. The capital stock is fixed at \$100,000.00 with shares of the nominal value of \$100.00. The stock is divided as follows:

THREATS OF ASSASSINATION.

Said to Have Been Made by Certain Members of the Police Force.

MAYOR SCOTT'S SEVERE REBUKE.

He Says the Department Has Deserved the City City Police and Urges a Reform.

It is briefly stated in the "News of last evening," Mayor Scott, late yesterday afternoon, summoned the members of the police department before him for the purpose of bringing about a reorganization among them.

Himself took measures to administer a rebuke to the men for their unoffical deportment, towards their superiors officers and towards each other. Among other things he said:

"Gentlemen, I have summoned you to the council chamber for the purpose of laying before you matters which are of vital importance to the city's welfare, and the neglect of which is serving to bring the administration into disrepute."

Judge Jones started in the course of his speech, "My dear friends,
