The Crop Prospects in California. SAN FRANCISCO, 14.—The crop reports from all parts of the inter-ior show but little change from the prospects two weeks ago. All over the State north of San Francisco Bay, the grain is in excellent condition and an abundant harvest is

In Centra Costa County and the northern portion of San Josquin Valley the prospects are good except on the west side of San Joaquin River, but the loss there will be compensated by the increased area of reclaimed lands put under cultivation for the first time. The southern part of San Joathere will be no crop raised except on the irrigated lands. In Santa Clara valley and in the

country around Monterey Bay the grain is in good condition, except in the important district of Salinas valley, where the want of rain is greatly felt, though a partial crop may be harvested with good spring
