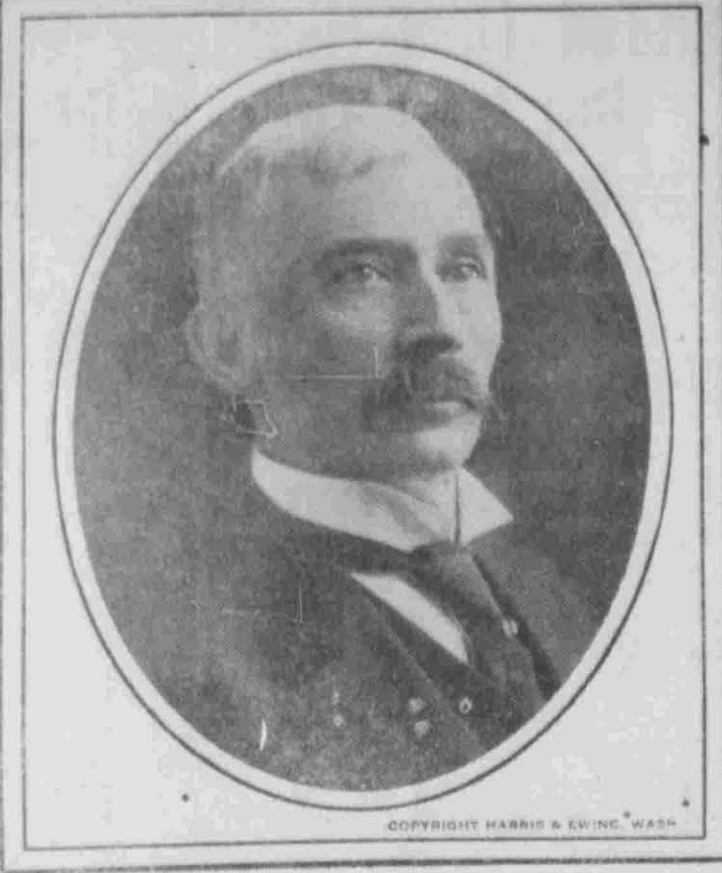


HINTS FOR AMATEUR GARDENERS

THE WISH BONE FLOWER.

This is the popular name of the dainty annual known to botanists as *torreya floribunda*, and which is growing to be a general favorite with the discriminating gardeners. It is especially well adapted for beds, hanging baskets, or borders.

The seed is very small, so should be carefully handled by the amateur. Sow the seed in pans or boxes in April, preparing the soil carefully and watering it thoroughly before planting. Let the moisture dry out somewhat on the surface, then sow the seed thinly on top, covering slightly with very fine soil or sand.

When the young plants are large enough to handle, transplant them into shallow boxes containing soil consisting of rotted soil and leaf mold and sand. From the boxes they are transferred into small pots and planted out about six inches apart the latter part of May.

The amateur who does not wish to take the trouble of raising the seedlings may obtain them ready to set out from a florist. By this method the risk of losing the young plants through mistakes in handling is avoided.

The plants are dainty little things and flower all summer. The flowers are blue and white, the latter being a distinct variety. They should be given a sunny place in the bed or border where they will not be crowded by taller plants.

SPRING PRUNING.

Pruning of shrubs and trees is a thinning out process which is necessary unless carried to an extreme. It allows the remainder of the plant to receive the nourishment which is saved by cutting unsightly or superfluous branches. A stronger growth is made possible in the rest of the plant. To get best results pruning should be had annually, thus removing all superfluous wood and better

preserving the health and shape of the plant.

All woody plants should be pruned when transplanted. The roots are necessarily reduced and active growth retarded by the transplanting process, so the top of the plant should be reduced correspondingly to lessen the amount of evaporation. In most cases the top should be cut back at least half while in. From trees all side branches are removed entirely, leaving nothing but the stem. This leaves the tree to form new branches in accordance with the new surroundings. In trees three or four years old several of the main branches are left, but they are cut back one-half so as to form a new top.

Spring is undoubtedly the best time for pruning in most cases. The wounds will heal quickly. The colder the climate the later pruning should be deferred. Severe pruning such as is sometimes necessary with laurels, box and yew should be done about October.

FOUR CLOCKS, OR MARVEL OF PERU.

These well known, free flowering annuals, deserve a place in every garden. A mixed packet of seed will produce a great variety of colors. They are best adapted for the mixed border or for long, narrow beds and there is no plant that will give the amateur gardener greater pleasure and satisfaction for the slight expense entailed.

They flower continuously all summer and being vigorous growers, must not be planted too thickly. The plants should stand 18 inches apart each way. Seed is generally sown in the hot bed in April and the young plants lifted and set out from one month to six months later. Young plants from small pots are usually to be had from most florists at the proper time for planting them out doors. Good results are obtained from

sowing the seed in the ground where the plants are to remain. But they will be much later flowering than the plants obtained from the florists or grown by the gardener himself in his hot bed. When planted outside the seed should be sown after danger of frost is passed and the ground is warm, usually the middle of May. Five or six seed should be planted in a hill and the plants should be thinned out when quite small. The seed should be covered with not more than one inch of loose soil. Any location with plenty of room and sunlight is suitable.

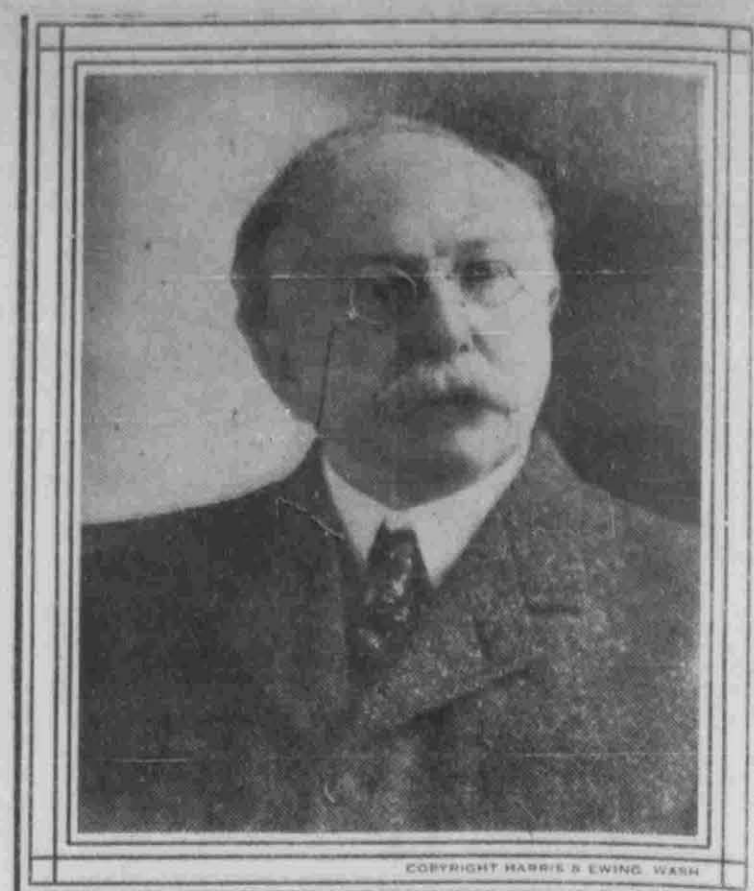
CANNAS.

Cannas stand at the head of the list of bedding plants for the American climate. Their bright colored flowers and large leaves make a brilliant showing all summer long. Their culture is easy and simple.

Plants ready to set out after all danger of frost has passed may be obtained from most florists. There is an immense variety of colors, and several different flowering types. Cannas are usually used in formal bedding and planting but excellent results may be obtained by planting them in clumps among the hardy shrubbery or in a border. The best effect is obtained by planting them against a dark background. Cannas make excellent center pieces for all flower beds. The dark leaved varieties have become very popular because of their rich color. As individual plants the cannas are not attractive, but should always be used for bold planting effects.
