The experiments will be carried out at the Sandy Hook proving grounds in New Jersey. Capt. Charles Day Chandler of the signal corps, one of the two qualified pilots in the army, left Washington today for New York to make arrangements for the balloons to be used. He will be stationed temporarily at Fort Wood, near New York, for that purpose.

Three balloons of comparatively small size will be purchased. No one will exceed the height of the balloons when in progress.

Signal corps men will be engaged in problems of navigating the air greater assurance.

Experiments will be conducted in trifling the motors of the Wright aeronauts owned by the government so that the flight of an aeroplane may be made comparatively noiseless. Attempts to communicate by wireless telegraphy from an aeroplane also will be made.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The first association of International Aeronautic Pilots was formed here today. It marked the one hundred and nineteenth anniversary of the first formation of an aeronautic balloon from Boston. Membership will comprise persons who have qualified and held balloon pilot's licenses, and is to be devoted to the encouragement of members of aero clubs to become navigators of air craft.

France leads with 114 aeronautical pilots. The United States and Great Britain have 35 each.
