CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Petitions, Etc.

WASHINGTON, 28.—In the Senate

to-day Booth presented a resolution

of the California legislature, asking

an appropriation for the construc-

tion of a bridge at San Luis Obispo

in that State, and declaring

the harbor of that place a port of

call for the United States navy.

The chair laid before the Senate

a memorial from the Governor and

State officers of Nevada, asking the

removal of the United States courts

from Carson City to Virginia; re-

ferred to committee on judiciary.

Logan introduced a bill to estab-

lish a mint for the coinage of gold

and silver at Chicago; referred.

Allison submitted an amend-

ment to the bill for the issue of the

3.65 D. C. bonds beyond the sum

of \$15,000,000 is hereby prohib-

ited.

Sargent submitted the following

as a substitute for that amendment,

and provided that certificates

hereof issued by the board au-

thorized, including the board, shall

be valid, and that the board have

3.65 bonds, and those which have

not been so converted, and certifi-

cates hereafter issued by the board

of audit, or their successors in office,

shall not exceed in the aggregate

sum of \$15,000,000.

Allison said the amendment of

Sargent might be added to that

submitted.

Hamilton (Tex.) inquired if the

Senator from Cal. (Sargent) thought

his amendment would stop the

issue of the 3.65 bonds, as long as

Congress recognized these bonds,

the issue of them would be contin-

ued. He would undertake to say

that the issue would go on until

the amount reached \$5,000,000 un-

less Congress stopped it.

Sargent said the object of his

amendment was to limit the power

of the committee to issue

bonds.
