

# ASSASSINATION OF VON PLEVHE.

Indictment on Which Sasonoff  
Will be Tried is a Formid-  
able Document.

GIVES INTERESTING FACTS.

Murderer Was Member of Fighting  
Organization Whose Object Was to  
Overthrow Autocracy.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 9.—The indictment on which Sasonoff, the assassin of Minister of the Interior von Plevhe, will be tried on Dec. 13, is a formidable document, revealing the history of the assassination plot, details of the crime, and the confessions made by the accused with the formal charge.

The document alleges that both Sasonoff and Skoritsky belonged to a fighting organization of social revolutionists, the central committee of which was organized abroad in 1902, to overthrow the autocracy and replace it with a republican, socialist regime.

The document describes the manner in which the party formed secret circles for the distribution of proclamations, organized the peasants, stirred up university students, fomented agrarian disturbances, preached terrorism and the murder of autocrats who sustained the autocracy, and took steps to suppress political disturbances.

It lays the murders of Siplaguine, von Plevhe's predecessor in the office of minister of the interior, and Bogdanovitch, governor-general of Ufa, and the attempt on the lives of Prince John Obolensky, governor-general of Finland, and J. J. Gorky, procurator-general of the holy synod, at the door of the fighting organization, which condemned von Plevhe to death soon after his appointment.

The attempt on von Plevhe's life was frustrated by the police on April 11 at the Hotel du Nord, by which

Pokotloff was blown up with a bomb, similar to the one that killed von Plevhe.

The indictment reveals in this connection a scandal in high life, a room adjoining the one in the Hotel du Nord occupied by Pokotloff having been occupied by a naval cadet and a woman of noble birth, who escaped death by being at supper at the time.

The execution of von Plevhe's death sentence, the indictment alleges, was then undertaken by Sasonoff, a student at Moscow university and the son of a merchant of Borsk, and Samuel Nevi Skoritsky, aged 29, a leather-worker of Knyshin, in the province of Grodno.

Sasonoff had been twice tried for reasonable offenses, first in 1900 and again in 1902. On the latter occasion he was exiled to Siberia for five years, but escaped abroad on his way into exile. The movements of both of the accused showed that the murder was planned for the occasion of one of Minister von Plevhe's weekly journeys, on Thursday, to the railroad station on the way to Piterhof to report to the emperor. He had previously made two trips to St. Petersburg on Wednesdays.

On Wednesday, July 27, the day before the murder, he went to Ostroff (a station on the St. Petersburg-Warsaw railway) having provided himself with a cloak of the naval pattern. The morning of the murder Sasonoff and Skoritsky met on a bridge over the canal near the Warsaw station, each being armed with an infernal machine, the igniter of which is minutely described.

The indictment then describes in detail the murder of von Plevhe and his

Here von Volmar, socialist, rivalled  
Herr Babel, the socialist leader, today,  
in the attack upon the government. At  
the conclusion of a long speech warmly  
arranging Chancellor von Thun for  
his alleged war fidelity attitude, von  
Volmar, Herr von Volmar took an  
Empire Wilhelm's telegram reference  
to the one sent to President Roosevelt.

His said:

"In coolness of telegram style we  
could learn something from the American  
discussion. The situation is in our hands  
not without advantage for Germany,  
since the emperor's head in a telegram to  
President Roosevelt did not offend him  
personally, but expressed admiration  
of the United States."

Von Volmar said the socialist has no  
means said their ideal in American  
conditions, Republican capitalism being  
better than monarchy, "but we can  
have a socialist republic, a republic  
in choosing our highest official  
and taking back his commission after a  
fixed period. There is no need of a law  
in the United States against arbitrary  
dismissal of a minister."

Quoting from von Bismarck's complaint  
that the socialist wanted to overthrow  
the existing order of things in Russia,  
von Volmar turned to the chancellor and  
said:

"Yes, Mr. Chancellor of the Reichstag,  
that is what we wish to do, and we  
have all Europe as our accomplices."

This statement was greeted with tremendous and long applause from the left.

The chancellor showed evident respect  
for his antagonist, who is a Bavarian  
liberal and still betrays the effects of  
a wound received during the Franco-  
Prussian war. The chancellor referred  
to von Volmar's "civilized" defense of  
Herr Babel, and defended the government  
policy towards Russia. He asserted  
that it was one of strict neutrality.

WOULD ENLARGE POWERS.  
President Wants Them for Inter-  
state Commerce Commission.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Enlargement of  
the powers of the interstate commerce  
commission is one of the questions  
which will be pressed vigorously at the  
present session of Congress. It is said  
that in the mind of President Roosevelt  
no problem is more important than  
this to all of the people.

In conference with members of the  
senate and house of representatives,  
the president has advanced the plan  
he advanced in his message in favor of  
the extension of the powers of the  
interstate commerce commission. With  
several members he discussed the sub-  
ject today. Until 1902 the commerce  
commission had the power to regulate  
freight rates, but the supreme court  
then decided that under the law the  
commission had no such authority.

Now, however, the commission  
have urged that the power be recom-  
mended by the president be conferred  
by law upon the commission.

NITROGLYCERINE EXPLOSION.  
Nothing of Man, Horses and  
Wagon Can Be Found.

Conleyville, Kan., Dec. 9.—A. B. Hester  
was blown up by an explosion of a mag-  
azine containing 800 quarts of nitro-  
glycerine. Nothing was found of the  
remains of two horses and a wagon.

Labor Leaders in Conference.  
Denver, Dec. 9.—George Estes, president  
of the United Brotherhood of  
Railway Employees and a member of the  
executive board of the American Rail-  
way union, and Clarence Smith, gen-  
eral secretary of the American  
Labor union, met the executive  
board of the Western Federation of  
Miners today for the purpose of discuss-  
ing plans for the advancement of the  
American Labor union and its subor-  
dinate unions. It is announced that  
no thought was ever given to the possi-  
bility of the miners' federation joining  
with the American Federation of Labor.

Underwriters' Interests.  
New York, Dec. 10.—A scheme  
recently proposed to form a national  
organization for the purpose of look-  
ing after the interests of miscellaneous  
underwriters, such as personal accident  
and health, employers and public li-  
ability, surety, plate glass and steam-  
boiler, has been perfected of members  
here. Twenty-two companies were per-  
sonally represented and many others  
unable to do so sent communications  
announcing their intention to join.

John Y. Stone of Maryland was  
chosen president of the new organiza-  
tion, which will be known as the board  
of casualty and surety underwriters.
