# CIVES INTERESTING FACTS.

Merderer Was Member of Fighting Organization Whose Object Was to Overthrow Autocracy.

St. Petersburg. Dec. 9 .- The indictment on which Sasoneff, the assassin of Minister of the Interior von Piehve, and Sikorifsky, his accomplice, will be nied on Dec. 13, is a formidable document realting the history of the assascnation plot, details of the crime, and revealing interesting facts about the accused and confessions made by them, winding up with the formal charge, The docement alleges that both Sa. smell and Sikorifsky belonged to a fighting organization of social revolujoniate, the central committee of which was organized abroad in 1902, to warthrow the autocracy and replace it ] with a republican, socialistic regime, i The document describes the manner in suchts party formed secret circles for he distribution of proclamations, orpanized the pensants, stirred up unl-versity students, fomented agrarian dissensions, preached terrorism and the surder of statesmen who sustained the utocracy, and took steps to suppress solitical disturbances.

Sasoneff had been twice tried for treasonable offenses, first in 1000 and ggain in 1902. On the latter occasion he was exiled to Siberia for five years, but escaped abroad on his way into ex-lie. The movements of both of the ac-cused showed that the murder was planned for the occasion of one of Min-ister von Plehve's weekly journeys, on Thursday, to the railroad station on the
