

but had not been visited by the elders since, and being not very well versed in the Gospel principles had become rather lukewarm, and were being led astray by some preachers of the Restorationists persuasion, a branch of the Second Adventists; their principles somewhat resemble the Gospel, and possibly more so than any of the other sects. These men came after our elders had left, boldly advocating their doctrines and defying all the sectarians, as they call them, to compare with them their principles. They met with some opposition but none would meet them either in public or private discussion, until they were considered by many as great champions. However we attended their meeting, and after closing they offered us the privilege of preaching to them, which we gladly accepted. At the close of which a lively discussion ensued for a time, but they soon sought a vain excuse to leave, to the astonishment of all present, creating quite a sensation; thus do we see the understanding of the wise and prudent coming to naught, before the weak things of the earth, who are to be chosen as heralds of the truth.

The condition of this country seems to be undergoing quite a change. Sickness is becoming much more prevalent, and we are informed that the lands which were rich and productive 50 years ago are now very poor. Generally after six or seven years' cultivation the uplands are worn out, and the few live stock raised are subject to ravaging distempers. Thus do we see that "the earth mourneth and fadeth away" by "the transgression" of its inhabitants, which is easily seen.

A strong feeling of enmity still exists toward the North among some, but the majority dread war from the sad experience of the past, which has left its landmarks in bold relief. A common expression here is that, "the late war was not a rich man's, but a poor man's fight." They also say that should war break out again "the blood of the rich shall flow as freely as that of the poor, and such is the topic of many."

Nearly all are looking forward with dread for the future; confidence appears to be entirely gone; division, contention and discord rule the day. "Men's hearts are failing them for fear of those things which are coming upon the earth;" in fact the time seems to be rapidly approaching when every man will be against his neighbor.

Editor Deseret News:

It is announced this morning that the California Legislature may be, after all, democratic, which would give a Senator not heretofore claimed to the democracy. If the report shall prove true, there will be no difficulty about a democratic organization of the Senate in March next unless President Hayes should have an opportunity of appointing Senator David Davis to the Supreme Bench, in which case a republican would be elected to the Senate in his place and the Senate organization might then again depend, as it now seems to, on the uncertain action of Senator Mahone, of Virginia. The recent election shows that the people of Virginia are already sorry they sent Mahone to the Senate, but their sorrow comes too late. They can, however, learn a valuable lesson from the present situation. They elected Mahone partly because of his position on the State debt question, and partly because he had been a good soldier in the civil war. I don't propose to discuss the Virginia debt business, but I wish to make the point that service in either army during the civil war ought not to be a test of fitness for civil office in either the North or the South. Both sections should learn this. The Mahone mistake will, I hope, teach sound wisdom in the matter.

The Patrons of Husbandry—the Grangers—will have their annual meeting here, commencing to-day. The order originated in this city in 1873. Many sections of the country, from New England to California, had and may still have "Grangers," and the present meeting, the managers claim, will have representatives from every State and Territory. As a political force, however, the order is dead. Its originators—all residents of this city—never contemplated any connection by the order with politics.


