A splendid variety of leather from the establishment of Messrs. Hancock & Page was the object of attraction to our shoemakers, and indeed to every one. Mr. C. C. Burr presented a specimen of maple sugar not to be surpassed in any county. A fine beaver hat, manufactured by Mr. Philo Johnson, had many admirers.

The committee on stock reported a good representation.

A committee was appointed to examine the machinery in different parts of the town. We have six sugar cane mills in operation, and we flatter ourselves that they can not be excelled in any part of the country. Of these the committee gave the preference to that of Mr. P. Ballard.

Bishop Young rendered great assistance to the committee of arrangements and was active in encouraging every department represented. In addition to home manufactured articles we had a table spread with curiosities both of nature and art collected from different parts of the world.

Good order prevailed throughout the exhibition, and at the close every one appeared satisfied. The whole affair was creditable alike to the committee and to the citizens generally.
