## DEMOLLI IS STILL IN JAIL.

Habeas Corpus Writ Was Denied at Price - If Italian Organizer is Released He Will be Re-Arrested.

Thère was no outbreak yesterday, by strikers in the coal regions. Notices of eviction were served in the Scofield, Winter Quarters and Clear Creek mining camps, on the men who refused to go to work, and the writs were received without disorder. The papers were served by deputy sheriffs attended with armed guards, and the troops were ready "within striking distance," But there was no resistance or threats of violence by the evicted.

The call for a general strike has been postponed for a few days until Con, Kelleher arrives, when a call will be made for all miners favorable to organized labor, to walk out. There has been no marked gain by either side in the last two days. Atty.-Gen. Breeden is at Scofield to investigate on his own account. He interviewed Justice Burrows who gave Demolli 30 days, and finds that the proceedings were regular. Breed-en. The court found no grøunds for the issuance of the writ as prayed for, and dismissed the petition, remarking that the petitioner had not gone to work the right way. Later, petitioner gave notice of an appeal, which was ap-proved of by County Atty. Frye, and Justice Burrows at Scofield was noti-fied to make an order discharging the prisoner. But Demolli had not been discharged last night, and as Sheriff Wilcox has two more warrants for the Italian's arrest, it is evident that the latter is destined to have a stremuous latter is destined to have a strenuous time of it before the law is through with him.
