

PANAMA LIBEL SUIT POLITICAL

U. S. Judge. Anderson Hearing
Case Says It Is More or Less
Of That Nature.

ASKS PERTINENT QUESTIONS.

Doubts If It Can Be Shown That De-
fendants Had Malicious Intent to
Libel Roosevelt and Others.

Lafayette, Ind., Oct. 11.—That the so-called "Panama libel case" was more or less of a political nature, was the comment of Judge A. B. Anderson, of the United States district court, at the close of argument today in the case of Charles R. Williams and Delavan Smith, proprietors of the Indianapolis News, whom the government is seeking to remove to the District of Columbia for trial on a charge of criminal libel.

Judge Anderson said he did not wish to give the impression that he had formed an opinion on the merits of the case, but wished to point out the trend of argument toward the courts' further enlightenment as to whether or not this was the probable cause for the indictment of Williams and Smith by the federal grand jury of the District of Columbia for criminal libel. The basis of the action is published articles intimating that there was a graft of \$25,000,000 in the sale of the Panama canal zone to the United States by the French company.

shows on the part of these defendants," the court asked Stuart McNamara, special attorney of the department of justice, in charge of the proceedings. The judge declared he doubted if it could be shown that the defendants had maliciously forethought in libel Theodore Roosevelt, Charles F. Tamm, William Nelson Cromwell, President Taft, J. P. PUBLIC DUTY OF PRESS.

"The press has a public duty to per-

form, and in political discussions it seems to be that the conception of libel should be greatly different from the conception that should apply to a case of libel on a person's private character."

Judge Anderson said if a set of Americans went to France and bought up the securities from the French Panama Canal company for \$12,000,000, as alleged, and then sold them to the United States for \$40,000,000, it should be regarded as "a nasty piece of business," but in no sense a crime. He said a crime was charged for the reason that it was alleged "that the defendants had maliciously forethought in libel Theodore Roosevelt, Charles F. Tamm, William Nelson Cromwell, President Taft, J. P. Morgan, Douglas Robinson, and others."

TO PRESERVE LIBERTY.

"It is my personal opinion," said the court, "that liberty is best preserved by giving every aspect of an alleged libel of the nature now under consideration, which should not be passed over in a libel case of persons of private character."

Mr. McNamara, in his argument, maintained that the Indianapolis News was sold in Washington, and that therefore the crime charged was committed in Washington as well as elsewhere. He said the records at Washington absolutely refute the charge of corruption in the Panama purchase, that the defendants had not considered the records in publishing the charges, and that whatever was the intention in their minds the act they committed amounted to criminal libel.

ROBBED GOT \$10,000.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 11.—Although the officials of the Great Northern Express have declined to make public the amount of money secured by the bandit who robbed the express office in the King street passenger station early yesterday morning, police detectives are authorized for the statement that it may reach \$10,000. It is also known that the robber overlooked gold, silver and currency in the safe amounting to between \$1,000 and \$2,000. As yet the police have been unable to find any track of the holdup man.

GATEMAN CHARGED WITH ROBBING SEATTLE FAIR

Seattle, Oct. 11.—All gatemen at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition were discharged last Saturday night, it being alleged that they had participated in or knew of stealing from the fair. The Times today asserts that the gatemen were organized in a syndicate with some of their superiors and that the money stolen was placed in bags to be divided later, the fund so collected amounted to \$25,000 at the time the thieves were discovered and stopped. The alleged method of the gatemen, whose turnstiles were unlocked by slipping a coin into a slot, was to catch the gate before it had registered, pull it back, take in another person and pocket his coin.

This will form, with the existing intelligence branch, a permanent navy war council for the study of strategy and the working out of war plans.

CRUSADE AGAINST ARTIFICIALLY COLORED MEATS

Chicago, Oct. 11.—The state food commission yesterday started a crusade against dealers deceiving the public with artificially colored and smoked fish, hams, bacon, sausage and other meats.

The investigators had their attention attracted through the cheap prices at which smoked salmon was offered. Examination showed that most of the "salmon" in the market was carp from the Fox river and other nearby streams. They were first given a bath of pink paint and then subjected to treatment in "liquid smoke." The ingredients of these are not named, as they are sold, but are recognized as having "accumulative effect," meaning that constant consumption will produce death. Little of the genuine salmon was

found at the stands. These "manufactured" fish may be sold on condition that they bear tags showing them to be bogus and there must be displayed signs on the walls showing that goods of that caliber are handled.

Fish was the principal article treated with chemicals, but plenty of ham, bacon and sausage was similarly dosed. On all such the investigators stuck warning tags.

NEW NAVAL SANITARIUM FOR THE PHILIPPINES

Manila, Oct. 11.—Capt. Giles H. Harber of the United States navy has selected as the site for the new naval sanitarium, the town of Baguio, the mountain capital of Benguet in the island of Luzon. Fifty acres are expected to be occupied before the completion of the sanitarium. The selection of this site probably will lead to the abandonment of the naval hospital at Yokohama.

In December, 1908, the Philippine commission proposed the construction of a government railroad six miles long from Dagupan, the northern terminus of the Manila railroad, to Baguio, and the establishment there of a sanitarium for troops serving in the Philippines to avoid sending them to the United States or Japan for recuperation.

Stockton, Cal., Oct. 12.—By a vote of 224 to 169, Stockton voted yesterday to repeal the ordinance passed a year ago for the Sunday closing of saloons.

By a majority of 96 a year ago it was decided that the saloons should be closed on Sundays. After more than 12 months of Sunday dryness, the majority in favor of opening the saloons is 385.

The ordinance will be repealed by the council.

HALF TIME SCHOOL.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Chicago's first "half time school" designed for boys and girls whose employers will permit them to attend on alternate weeks will be opened next Monday.

The courses of instruction to be offered will consist of shop work, English, mechanical drawing, history of industry, current events, workshop mathematics and civics. The changes are planned to permit boys and girls to work part time and to attend school part time.
