## BY TELEGRAPH.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

WASHINGTON, 27.—Forty-three

Senators, five more than a quorum,

were present. Several petitions were

presented.

Miller, of California, introduced a

bill to increase the fees of witnesses

in United States courts.

He offered a resolution that the

Postmaster General submit a showing

of the annual payments to

steamship companies for carrying

mail.

Call submitted a resolution asking

the Secretary of the Interior for the

number of contested homestead

entries pending, and if legislation is

necessary to expedite decisions in

such cases.

The civil service bill was resumed

on Hawley's amendment prohibiting

the collection or collection of

political contributions by officers of

the government from other officers

or employees.

Beck opposed the amendment as a

sham, because its provisions did not

extend to other persons as well as

to government officials. Instead of

operating personally, Senators could

do it through their private secretaries.

The good faith of the Senate

in seeking to prevent these political

assessments upon government em-

ployees had been tested by the

amendment offered by Vest on Sat-

urday, prohibiting the payment of

such assessments to any person,

whether in the employ of the gov-

ernment or not. The amendment

had been supported by the unani-

mous vote of democratic Senators,

but the republicans unanimously

opposed and rejected it.

Hawley said Beck had been chal-

lenged emphatically to produce one

person who had been removed from

office for failing or refusing to make

a political contribution in the last

campaign. No such person had

been produced, but if it should turn

out that any person had been dis-

missed on that account, he hoped

the officer who dismissed him would

receive as severe punishment as the

law permitted, as well as the con-

tempt of the American people. The

object at which (Hawley's) amend-

ment aimed was the prevention

of oppressive exactions from

employees of the Government, and

it was drawn carefully with that

object in view. The proposition to go

beyond this and provide that no

clerk after earning and receiving his

salary should accept or receive in

any office, business or employment

to which the provisions of this act

are applicable.

Beck offered an amendment by

inserting after the word "bever-

ages," the words "in excess of."

Agreed to.

Blair spoke briefly in support of

his amendment.

Edmunds said the amendment as

it stood contained a legal implication

that other votes were to be exclud-

ed from consideration by the civil

service committee, and that the

defect he moved to amend by in-

serting after the word "in excess of"

the words "or guilty of any other

immoral habit." (Laughter.)

After some discussion the amend-

ment was agreed to, yeas 82, nays

16.

Blair's amendment as amended

was agreed to.

Plumb offered an additional

amendment, which was adopted,

providing that where two or more

members of a family are in the

public service in grades covered by

this act, no more than one of them

shall be eligible to appointments

in such grades also.

George offered an amendment

providing that sending by mail or

otherwise to any government officer

or employee, any letter or print

containing any solicitation of contribu-

tions for political purposes, or re-

sponding to such communication by

mail or otherwise, should come under

the penalties prescribed in this act;

lost.

Brown offered the following: As

nearly all public positions are now

filled by republicans, it is further

enacted that, when the board of ex-

aminers have ascertained by public

examination, which shall be open

to all applicants, that two, or if there

be more than two, have equal qual-

ifications and merit, they shall select

from among those best qualified one

whose political affiliations are with

the political party having the lowest

number in position until there is at

least an approximate to an equal

share in the patronage of the gov-

ernment; among those who bear

equally its burdens; and that after

such approximation to equality is

reached, it shall be illegal for such

board of examiners to inquire into or

consider the political qualifications of

any applicant for position. Brown

advocated this amendment as a

measure of justice, necessary in

order to make a fair start under the

law.

Logan opposed the amendment,

as presenting an utterly impractic-

able proposition, which could never

be carried into effect. The amend-

ment was rejected, yeas 12, nays

72.

The bill having been considered

in committee of the whole, was re-

ported to the Senate and all amend-

ments adopted in committee agreed

to, except the one offered by Blair

in relation to the use of intoxicating

liquors.

Rayed asked for a separate vote

on this, which he regarded as an

unnecessarily tyrannical and likely

to give the whole reform movement

which the bill related an air of insu-

perity.

Blair assured Rayard that he had

proposed the amendment in all

sincerity and earnestness.

On motion of Hawley, the words

"or guilty of any other immoral

conduct," inserted in Blair's amend-

ment. Edmunds' motion was

stricken out.

The amendment as amended was

then adopted by a vote of yeas 82,

nays 16. Those who voted no were

Bayard, Call, Chittenden, Davis (W.

Va.) Jones, Lamar, Pendleton,

Pugh and Vance.

Morgan offered an additional

section, providing that no recom-

mendation of any person who should

apply for office or place, under the

provisions of this act, which may be

given by any Senator or member of

the House of Representatives, or

Senator or member of the House of

Representatives, shall be received or

considered by any person concerned in

making examinations or appoint-

ments under this act.
