

# NOT SATISFIED WITH THE REPORT

Hobday Stirs up Strife in His Criticism of Special Water Proposition.

COLLEAGUES RESENT INSULT.

Mill Creek Deal Meets With Opposition—New Law Controlling Streams.

The special water proposition was fought out again on the floor of the city council chamber last night, with the result that the session was prolonged until midnight and during the arguments on the matter many stinging personal remarks were passed back and forth among the various councilmen. The matter was brought up on two occasions during the meeting first, when the report of City Auditor Wells on the expenditures of the bond money was read, and again when Wells introduced a resolution authorizing the execution of an agreement with the Mill Creek farmers for the exchange of water with the city.

The return was submitted in compliance with a motion introduced by Hobday, and it contained an itemized statement and the following recapitulation of the bond fund:

Nov. 30, 1905, aggregating \$129,968.25.

Paid since Nov. 30, 1905, \$702.43.

Estimate to contractor, \$7,157.19.

Total ..... \$122,857.51.

Proceeds of bond sale, \$85,000.00.

Balance on hand ..... \$37,142.29.

HOBDAY NOT SATISFIED.

Hobday at once raised the objection that the report did not comply with his request as he wanted to know the amount expended, the amount contracted for and the amount unexpended and not contracted for. He also occasioned to criticize some members on their special water committee for failing to give him the information desired and stated that it was almost impossible for certain councilmen to get any definite information at all concerning the water proposition. Wells replied to Hobday and stated that he had not been able to furnish any information concerning the report and had submitted a complete report in November showing everything that Hobday asked for, but the council did not care to have it read and simply filed it. He argued that if Hobday had wanted information he could certainly have secured it from the reporter taking the time to read it. Hobday fully denied that the water committee had always been willing to furnish information on the matter, and said that Wells had at first stated that he did not want the public to know what it was doing on the proposition. The statement was emphatically denied by Wells who said that he had never made any such remark.

FERNSTROM HEARD FROM.

Fernstrom then mixed in the fight and stated that any councilman could get any information he wanted from the head of any department of the city or from any city official and it was Hobday's fault if he did not get what he wanted as he should have gone to the proper department and he would have received the proper information in 30 minutes. He said that if Hobday did not have time to attend to the business of his office he should resign. "I would if there were more men in here like me," retorted Hobday.

Fernstrom continued his remarks and stated that the information had been given to the council on several occasions but the trouble was that some of the members could not read the information when they got it. He closed his remarks with the statement, "You make me tired."

Hobday replied by saying that it was true he could not live on \$35 per month and could not give his entire time to the city's work and contended that if two-thirds of the councilmen were going to run the whole thing there was no need of electing the rest as they had never shown any desire to help the committee in the least.

Wood took a hand in the argument and declared that he had introduced a similar resolution to that of Hobday, and it had been ignored, and it was impossible to get definite information on the water scheme.

"Well, I doubt the wisdom of electing some of you," replied Fernstrom.

RESENTED BY HEWLETT.

President Hewlett took the floor and asserted the indignation of all the members of the special water committee. He read the resolution of Hobday and then read the report of the water committee recommending that the proper officials furnish the desired information. This report, he said, had been adopted by the committee and the water committee had done its duty to have the proper information submitted. He thought that the criticisms of the committee were entirely uncalled for as it had always been ready and willing to furnish information and to consult and receive suggestions from other members of the council but they had never shown any desire to help the committee in the least.

Wood took a hand in the argument and declared that he had introduced a similar resolution to that of Hobday, and it had been ignored, and it was impossible to get definite information on the water scheme.

BACK TO AUDITOR.

Black moved that the report be referred back to the auditor with instructions to report on the money actually paid out of the bond fund, the amount contracted for and the amount unexpended and not covered by contract. The motion was carried.

MILL CREEK DEAL.

The water matter was again gone over when Wells introduced a resolution authorizing the execution of an agreement with the Lower Mill Creek Irrigation company for the exchange of water with the city, and the payment for the payment by the city of about \$80,000 to the farmers for the exchange. Wells made a strong argument in behalf of the resolution, but it was opposed by Black, Wood and Hobday, who objected to doing anything on the Mill creek matter until the suit now pending in Judge Morse's court was settled.

RESOLUTION FAILS.

It was voted by Wells that the agreement provided that the amount of water to be exchanged depended upon the amount awarded to each owner by the decree to be rendered by Judge Morse. This did not satisfy the opposition, and Black moved to have the whole matter laid over for 30 days. This motion was lost by the following vote: Ayers, E. H., Davis, Fernstrom, Tuddenham and Wells; Nays—Black, Dean, Hartenstein, Hobday, Freece, Wood and Hawley.

PROTEST WITHDRAWN.

A report was received from the special water committee recommending that the city withdraw its protest filed with the department of agriculture against the application of the Intermountain Power company for certain rights to the use of the Salt Lake City water reservoir and for the possible site in Big Cottonwood canyon. The company agrees to build a reservoir at a cost of \$86,000 for the storage of the flood waters of Big Cottonwood creek, and consents to the city using the reservoir after it is released from the company's power plant.

In compliance with this agreement the major has already filed an application with the state engineer for the appropriation of said water. The report of the committee also recommends that the city engineer be instructed to propose the cleaning and straightening the proposed reservoir site so as to make it fit for storing water for culmey purposes and that the board of public works advertise for bids for such work as soon as the power company's work on the reservoir is completed.

COURT BUSINESS.

City Recorder Crutchlow reported that during the month of November 365 cases were disposed of in the criminal division of the city court for which the amount \$1,167.00 was received in fines and forfeitures. The receipts of the civil division of the court were \$182.

Upon motion of Black the sum of \$1,000 was appropriated for grading Seventh North street between Second and Fourth West streets in compliance with the petition of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company.

Writes Letter Endorsing the Work of The Y. M. C. A.

Gov. Cutler has written a reply to a request from Editor F. W. Ober of "Association Men" the New York publication of the Y. M. C. A. for an expression of opinion on the work of the organization. The governor's communication follows:

"My Dear Sir—In reply to your communication of 6th inst., I am pleased to give hearty and unanimous approval to the work being done by the Young Men's Christian Association. I am and always have been an advocate of pleasant and healthful activity, both in the work of life and in its recreations. Inaction is one of the most prolific causes of evil, as it leads to dissipate to poverty and to corrupting associations. Therefore, in the interest of the young I object the directing of the normal activities of the young into safe and wholesome channels. The rounded development of individual character, the community is improved, government strengthened and individual character brought to a better fruition through the work done by your association.

It was received by the city council of Salt Lake City.

The mayor of Salt Lake City, in the name of said city, and the city council authorized and requested to present the following memorial to Gov. John C. Cutler, governor of Utah to be presented to the next Legislature:

LAW GOVERNING STREAMS.

President Hewlett introduced an important resolution providing for the control of special water companies, asking for legislation which will extend the city's jurisdiction over the streams which it derives its water supply from 10 to 20 miles above the point of diversion. The resolution, which went in full, was adopted by a unanimous vote.

It was received by the city council of Salt Lake City.

The purpose of this memorial is manifested to all who understand the situation of Salt Lake City. The necessities of said city are such that it must derive its water supply from the surrounding streams emanating from the point of diversion.

The present jurisdiction of the city extends only 10 miles above the point of diversion. Beyond the 10 mile limit, on every stream from which water is derived are many unsanitary structures and arrangements which threaten the health of the city and its inhabitants.

Therefore, we petition the honorable governor and Legislature of the State of Utah to confer the above powers upon cities of the first class.

WILL GET THEIR PAY.

The council turned down the veto of Morris to the appropriation of the extra pay to the councilmen and the city recorder and his clerks for canvassing the returns of the recent city election amounting in all to \$305. The appropriation was passed over the veto by a vote of 10 to 1. President Hawley casting the only vote in favor of the veto.

Salt Lake Writers Commercial Club Concerning Fort Douglas.

The board of governors of the Commercial club received last evening a letter from a resident of this city relative to Fort Douglas, in which the writer said:

"As far as location is concerned, it is universally admitted to be one of the most desirable military posts in the interior. With the completion of the several lines of railroad converging in Salt Lake, it occupies a strategic point which has enlisted the attention of the general army. The fact that it received the attention that posts have, in the board it would be superior to almost all interior posts as regards its availability, and would form a most beautiful park adjacent to the city.

"I desire to call your attention further to the fact that there has been made an adequate appropriation made for the improvement of Fort Douglas. The expenditures heretofore have been from the omnibus appropriation made for military purposes. Work has now ceased because no funds are available.

"The improvement of the post and its surroundings would receive the united support of the citizens, the present commandant, and all citizens who are interested in the future of our city.

"If the Commercial club took up the matter of obtaining a special appropriation for the improvement of Fort Douglas, the club's usual vigor in manifesting its efforts would result in establishing one of the most important and picturesque interior military posts in the country."
