Indications Are That All Will be Gone Before the End of The Month.

THEIRS IS NOW A LOST CAUSE.

Vacant Places Being Rapidly Filled With New Men-Output Increasing Daily.

(Special to the "News.") Sunnyside, Dec. 16 .- Some of the strikers here are trying to sell out so that they can move away before the end of the month. Twenty new men came in last night and the indications are that by the end of the week all the vacant places will be filled so that there will be no room for the strikers even if they wanted to return to work.

There is now plenty of slack here for the coke ovens and indications are that much of it will be shipped to Castle Gate next week. There were 264 miners at work in the mine yesterday and the day before the output reached FLATTENED OUT.

That the coal strike has flattened out That the coal strike has flattened out is now being generally recognized. Here practically the full force of diggers is at work, with the usual output of coal and coke; and at Castle Gate opera-tions will be resumed next Monday with half the customary force. The foreign-ers continue to leave the country, most of them with the intention of return-or to their native snargberti and othys ing to their native sparghetti and olive oil. Militiamen Settled With for Twenty Days' Service.

The ghost is walking in the militia camps today, and each soldier is being paid for 20 days' service. The enlisted men receive \$1.50 per day, and the of-ficers are paid according to their rank.

The sum to be dealt out is \$9,100, which does not include the quartermaster's or commissary's expenses. The stat-utes provide that the enlisted men in the guard shall receive \$1.50 per day durig the first twenty days they are in the field. At the expiration of the twenty days enlisted men are put on regular army pay, \$13,50 a month, or 43 cents per day. During the first twen-ty days lleutenants receive \$2.50 per day, captains and officers of the regi-mental staff, \$3 per day, general offi-cers receive \$4 per day. After the expiration of 20 days' ser-vice, captains receive \$150 per month, first lleutenants \$125 per month, second lleutenants \$15 per day after the first twenty days. Twenty days of service in the field expired Sunday, and unless other provisions are made by the Legis-lature the men are now on regular army pay. The number of men in the field has been reduced from 293 to 250.

FULLY DISCUSSED. Asst. Secy. of State Loomis Defends President's Course in Recognizing It. NO DESIRE TO ANNEX PANAMA

PANAMA REPUBLIC

Executed Will of the American People With Due Regard to International Law and Rights.

New York, Dec. 15 .- The conditions which resulted in the recent establishment of the republic of Panama were discussed tonight at the banquet of the Quill club held at the Hotel Manhattan, by Francis B. Loomis, assistant secretary of state of the United States, and M. Philippe Bunau-Varilla, minister for Panama. Mr. Loomis said: "We have not desired to annex Panima, and we have not done so. The president simply executed the will of the American people, with due regard to international law and rights. He was instructed by Congress to secure a canal route on the isthmus of Panama if possible. He waited until the ad-journment of the Colombian congress and gave the government of that country every opportunity to ratify the treaty, or to propose some proper method looking to the ratification of a new treaty, and the Colombian con-gress, in utter bad faith, rejected the

reaty and adjourned. "In less than a week's time, and be-fore the president could be reasonably expected to turn to grave consideration of the Nicaragua route, the long ex-pected and inevitable revolution in Panama came to pass. The peopl arose as one man, and in thorough ac cord, without the firing of a single shot, unresisted, they quietly established a government of their own. They had thrice been independent and the right of secession was. I believe, expressly stipulated in some of their constitu-tions "The president dispatched our mea-

ger naval force ashore, consisting of forty marines, to do what they could to preserve peace, order and unimpeded transit across the 1sthmus. H promptly recognized the de facto gov He ernment as soon as he learned that it was in peaceful possession of the coun-try. This is the usual and necessary proceeding. We have on many occa-sions recognized new governments with an equal degree of celerity and prompt-ness. Later the republic of Panama was given full recognition. We are acting fairly and lawfully under the treaty of 1846. The adminitsration, am sure, has no apologies to offer for

its course." Mr. Loomis discussed the rejection of the canal treaty by the Bogota con-gress, and continued:

"If the revolution in Panama had not occurred; if the American people, guid-ed by the opinion of its most learned, efficient and highly trusted engineers, continued to think the Nicaragua route an impracticable one; if the people and Congress of this country had insisted that we wait for a year, or until such time as the politicians at Bogota were ready to negotlate a new canal treaty, and in the meantime the Congress had

I may safely assert, without fear of contradic tion by any well-informed person, that the government of France would not have stood by and witnessed the pillage of thousands of her people through the act which Bogota politicians devised for the lootnig from the French company of \$40,000,000. The moment that the cables flashed

from Bogota to Paris the last astounding news that the extension of the French concession was canceled, a French squadron from Martinique French squadron from Martinique would have borne down upon the isth-mus and perhaps landed marines at Colon and sent them across the isth-mus to Panama and along the line of mus to Panama and along the line of the canal to protect the interests and property of French citizens. There would, in all probability, have been armed conflict between France and Co-lombia, or France at least would have felt herself compelled to hold the isth-mus for a long period. This would have wrought immediately and polg-nantly upon the sensibilities of the American people in respect to the Mon-American people in respect to the Mon-roe doctrine, and we should no doubt have found ourselves viewing France have found ourselves viewing France with annoying apprehension. The French warships might easily have been followed by those of England and Holland: and Panama, like the Balkan states, might well have been expected to furnish the spark to set half the world in flames."
