

TELEGRAPHIC. BURNED HIM ALIVE.

The Negro Who Burned Mrs. Bell,
Near Tyler, Texas.

THOUSANDS WITNESS THE SCENE.

Women and Children Among the Spectators—Business Houses Closed
for the Occasion.

TYLER, Tex., Oct. 29.—The negro who so recently murdered Mrs. Bell was captured this morning about 4 o'clock, three miles from Kilgore, soon after the officers had him surrounded, a mob of some 200 men, heavily armed, arrived on the scene and demanded the immediate surrender of the prisoner, which was reluctantly given. The mob carried off the negro to the jail, where they arrived this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The crowd continued to gather at the scene of the horrible crime until nearly 2,000 citizens of Tyler and vicinity were there.

A few moments before the scene was brought to a peace a meeting was held by a committee appointed to investigate his identity. Witnesses were summoned and closely questioned. The result was that enough identification was secured.

In a few minutes an officer arrived from the city, followed by 200 men selected and well-armed men. When next the scene the officers were overpowered and disarmed, and the negro, Henry Hilliard, brought before the sheriff. It reads as follows:

"I am arrested by 'Wig' Smith. You know what they will do with me. I don't see you any more, goodbye." —HENRY HILLIARD.

After the confusion and identification, a vote was taken as to the method of punishment. It was decided to agree to the death sentence, and that he should die by the penalty on the public square. The line of march was taken toward Tyler, and at 4 o'clock the head of the line entered the main street, where no less than 2,000 people were gathered. Long, drawn-out shrieks and children were congealed on the sidewalks surrounding the public place. Wagons, carriages, traps and pack-buggies were converted into grand stands and were thronged at

every available spot. A scaffold was erected in the center of the square. Wagons laden with shooting-wire, nail and straw were driven to the scene and placed to protect the spectators.

The negro was then given an opportunity to speak, but his words were inaudible, but when he offered up his last prayer his words could be heard several blocks.

He was then led to the iron rail which encircled the scaffold, and Mr. Bell, the husband of the condemned woman, applied the match. The negro uttered a sharp cry, and was applied until he was incinerated. It was exactly fifty minutes. The L. & N. train was crowded with people throughout the state.

Hundreds of negroes witnessed the execution, and representative negroes express their indorsement of the punishment.

The effects were powerless and the sheriff wired the governor, but his message was too late. All business houses were closed, and the big Cotton Belt shops were deserted.

ON A CHARGE OF FORGERY.

The Son of a Notary Challenged At Trial in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—Mr. Geo. O'Brien, of Chicago, is in the city prison awaiting examination on a charge of forging a \$100 check. The prosecuting witness is willing to let him out on bail, but the Aug.-Chilcott law firm, which has been retained, has refused to do so, and the defense has been unable to make arrangements to have him released.

O'Brien, who is a German with a pronounced dialect, and to long as he was testifying himself, still taking notes, was a witness of unusual interest to the witness's efforts to stimulate the difference between "him" and "them."

Frederick Eisinger, who kept the scales, gave evidence of a corroborative nature.

The check man, G. Hartow Lampen, swore that he had seen O'Brien at the bank on August 24, 1894, when he had stopped there about some small business.

Mr. Adel A. Alzam, a physician who lives at No. 1910 North Eleventh street, said he had seen O'Brien on August 21, 1894, under the name of Howell. On the 19th of August a man called to see O'Brien and was shown to his room, according to testimony. He identified O'Brien's picture as the caller. Later he saw O'Brien again.

Josiah W. Highsmith had known O'Brien well and had taken him to his doctor's house to get help. O'Brien had sold him a shirt. Harry was not his right name, he said, but he was a son of his wife and mother from the West.

John Cairnes was called, but as he was not in court, an adjournment was granted.

Finally it was decided to send the young man west, and his father purchased him a ticket to California.

TRIAL OF DURRANT.

Judge, Jurors and Attorneys Have a Party With the Barb.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—The close of arguments for the defense in the trial of Theodore Durrant today was marked by a general social gathering of friends. Thirty-eight miles east of Tapeta, he was arrested. The minister is also a boy, being only 13 years old. His name is David Conner. He was arrested this morning in Valley Falls, thirty miles south of here. He was brought to justice because he was taken before Justice Marceau made a confession. He was bound over to the district court, and was

taken to the penitentiary for safe keeping.

Young Durrant had been missing for fifteen days last Sunday morning, when his body was found in a hole in the ground, a mile and a half from his home, with two bullet holes in his brain.

Conner, in his confession, said that the killing was accidental, claiming that he stumbled and the gun exploded.

Suburban Press Office.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 29.—Two suburban trains on the Missouri Pacific road, one bound down, with subscriptions returning home from the shores of Lake Michigan, the other coming north, started with the entire contents of the cars about midnight tonight. A terrible wreck resulted, four engines being killed and one broken, and a passenger train fatally injured.

The cars were still under the wrecks, though unbroken. Their names are not ascertainable now. First Train and Doctor and Parrot Train of this city, were a passenger and the incoming train, are all likely to be the same. The Missouri Pacific reported. The passengers state the injured men cannot live until morning.

The two trains met at each other about a sharp curve. The engineer of the down train, if not dead, is severely injured. If the report given is not true some blunder is responsible for the accident.

Trains have been engaged in racing. One engine train, and another the two cars which had struck the wrecks, with eighty passengers and their crews, Rodriguez.
