COMMEMORATIVE SERVICE

President Snow's Funeral Train Met by Weber Stake Officials-Floral Offerings.

Sunday School Union Meeting-Tribute to Respected Dead-Lecture by Dr. Talmage-Funeral Services.

The deep sorrow and sympathy felt by the people of Ogden City and Weber county occasioned by the sudden death of President Lorenzo Snow was fully emphasized and shown yesterday afternoon by the very large crowd of several noon by the very large crowd of several thousand people who gathered at the Union depot to meet the funeral train which arrived here at 2:35 o'clock bear-ing the remains from Salt Lake en route to Brigham City for interment. President L. W. Shurtliff and his coun-selors, Superintendent T. B. Evans and his counselors, of the stake Sunday his counselors, of the stake Sunday schools, and the Sunday school board, a majority of the Sunday school officers and teachers, and the stake male chorus under Prof. Ballantyne, met at chorus under Prof. Ballantyne, met at the Ogden Tabernaciè at 2 o'clock and marched in a body to the depot, the stake Sunday school banner being car-ried at the head of the procession. At the depot President Shurtliff and Sup-erintendent Evans, on behalf of the stake and the Sunday schools, placed on the bler of the beloved President a magnificent floral design, about five by four feet supnorted on an easel. The four feet supported on an easel. floral trobute was made up of beautiful asters, roses and carnations with a wheat sheath at each corner. The male chorus and the entire gathering joined in singing "Nearer, My God, to Thee," as the funeral train left the depot plat-

It is estimated that at least two thousand five hundred people were gathered on the depot grounds to pay their tribute of respect to the dead, evidencing the love and esteem in which President Snow was held in this stake.
