Lamping and Scott Calhoun. The following officers were elected: President, J. T. Moran of Oak-land; vice presidents, E. F. Bert of San Francisco, and George Lamping of Seattle; secretary, James H. Ander-so nof San Francisco. The San Fra so not San Francisco; treasurer, Theo. dore Goodman of San Francisco. The The board of control will consist of J. F. Morley, J. L. Marshall and President Moran. The board of directors will consist of one member from each town. Each of the towns represented was give na franchise and will be requested to put up a cash guarantee of \$5,000 on or before Jan. 15, 1903. Messrs. Bert, Ewing, Marshall and Calhoun were ap-pointed a committee to frame rules and pointed a committee to frame rules and laws. Harris was empowered to select the playing balls. The playing rules of the American league of 1902 were adopted for the season of 1903. It was decided that each manager may hire as many players as he desires up to May 15, but after that time he will be limited to 15 men. All players must be in either Oregon, Washington or Call-fornia, before Sept. 15 and report to fornia, before Sept. 15, and report to the umpire having charge of the series. The season of 1903 will commence March 26 and close Nov. 29. The teams will play in all towns every day of the week except Monday. "PSYCHOLOGY OF LABOR."

Commissioner Carrol D. Wright Discusses the Problem.

Washington, Dec. 29.-Before the American Association for Advancement of Science, Carroll D. Wright, commis-sioner of labor and vice president of the somer of abor and vice president of the section of social and economic science, spoke on the "Psychology of the Labor Question." He said in part: "Observation and experience, cover-

ing many years of investigation of va-rious elements of the labor question have convinced me that there are un derlying features which cannot be reached by the statistical method; that the mental attitude of parties has very much to do with the labor question; from whatever standpoint it is consid-ered. This is well illustrated by the statistical parties to methodes. statistics relative to mortgages. "At the eleventh census an attempt
