That the common law of England, as it existed in the Colon-ies at the date of the Declaration

in the Territory of Utah, so far as the same is practicable;" and Whereas, these sections are n un-just and oppressive, your petitioner, in behalf of twoman, and by au-thority of the Woman Suffrage Asociation of the State of Pennsyl vania, would respectfully pray your honorable bodies not to pass a law containing the above-named sec-tions, nor any law whatever by which the women of Utah may be disfranchised, or in any way be de-prived of their civil or political

We pray your honorable bodies to grant our petition for the follow-First. Because the disfranchising

of these women will render them wholly subject to the power of the men who are voten in that Territory, as they will be compelled to obey laws which they had no voice in making, and will have no power
