GERMANS OUT EN MASSE.

Crowds Wildly Enthusiastic as He Drove Through the Streets—Departure for the East.

Milwaukee, March 4.—Milwaukee was host to Prince Henry of Prussia for six hours this afternoon and gave him a reception that was highly enthusiastic and entertaining. His special train came at 4 o'clock and at 10 was away again on the long run to Niagara and New England. The intervening time was all given over to the reception and entertainment of the royal visitor.

It began with a drive through the business and residential districts in review before a crowd that numbered 200,000. Then there was a public reception at which Gov. Robert La Follette and Mayor David Rose voiced their welcome and the United Singing societies raised their voices in mighty chorus. There was also a splendid illumination and a thrilling night run. Later there was a banquet, at which the prince met leading citizens of the city and state. The thousands of German residents in Milwaukee joined heartily in the welcome of the young prince, to whose house they once owed allegiance, and veterans of the German wars were drawn up. Just outside the station 1,000 veterans of the German wars were drawn up. They had come here from Green Bay, Stevens Point, Port Washington, Appleton, Plymouth, Fond du Lac, Racine and other distant points in the state, and they gave the prince a volley of cheers as he passed them. The business streets were blocked with people and the police had to fight to keep a driveway clear. Prince Henry was given the honor of riding in the first carriage to roll across the new Grand avenue-Wisconsin street bridge, and as this point was reached battery 1, stationed on the lake front, fired a salute of 21 guns. The reception of the prince as he drove through the streets was wildly enthusiastic and dramatic. As he entered the exhibition building for the public reception. As he appeared on the stage, escorted by his staff, the Manchester chorus of 600 voices sang "Der Deutsche Lied." There were 20,000 persons packed in the exhibition building, and it was long before they were sufficiently stilled for Chairman Johnson to briefly introduce Mayor Rose. "Yet, as we assert our right to govern ourselves by republican forms we concede the right of others to subject their allegiance to royal dominion and make no criticism of the choice. Especially pretty was the lighting of the court of honor on Grand avenue.

There was a great display of hunting and under the glare of the lights it looked even more attractive than in the daylight. Crowds thronged the streets during the evening, with the Hotel Pfister as the common center, and the scene was a brilliant one.

Prince Henry of Prussia was the guest at a banquet tonight given at the Hotel Pfister by the citizens of Milwaukee. The dinner lasted about two hours. First Boat From East to Chicago.

Chicago, March 5.—The first boat to reach Chicago from the east shore this spring was the Edward Buckley, which has just arrived from Manitowish. She has a cargo of 1,000 tons of salt.

It is said the early opening of navigation at Chicago is due from the efforts of the salt trust in getting its product to market with as little delay as possible. It is expected that several others of the steam barge fleet will shortly enter the salt trade on Lake Michigan, but the big fellows whose business takes them to the lower lakes will have to wait for some weeks before the southerly winds open up a passage for them through the Straits of Mackinac. The Buckley reported but little trouble in getting through the ice floes on the way over.

United Railroads of San Francisco.

San Francisco, Cal., March 5.—Under the name of the United Railroads of San Francisco, the syndicate which has obtained control of the principal street lines of this city has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. The capital is \$100,000,000, divided into 400,000 shares. The corporation is controlled in the east and the incorporation here is merely a formality to give the company a legal right in California. The incorporators are George E. Starr, G. H. Whitfield, William M. Abbott, George E. Starr and Charles P. Gale. Of these Starr subscribed \$157,000 and the others \$100 each. These men are presumed to be acting for others as Abbott is a deputy and the clerk of the Board of Supervisors, and the attorney for the corporation. The enumeration of properties includes the lines of the Market street, the San Mateo, the Sutter and the Sutter street systems. The only lines not included are those on California, Geary and Union streets.

Written to a Mother Who Lost Five Sons in Battle.

EXPRESSES DEEP SYMPATHY

Soiled and Faded, Torn and Frayed, Letter Was Found in Some Rubbish on Broadway, New York.

New York, March 5.—Soiled and faded, torn and frayed, a letter written by Abraham Lincoln a few months before his assassination has been found in some rubbish and papers on Broadway near the postoffice. It reads as follows:

"Executive Mansion, Washington, Nov. 21, 1864.

"To Mrs. Bixby, Boston, Mass. I have been shown in the file of the war department a statement of the adjutant general of Massachusetts, that you are the mother of five sons who have died gloriously on the field of battle. "I feel how weak and fruitless must be any word of mine which should attempt to beguile you from the grief of a loss so overwhelming. But I cannot refrain from tendering you the consolation that may be found in the thanks of the republic they died to save. I pray that our heavenly Father may assign to your suffering heart a comforter and leave only the cherished memory of loved and lost and the solemn pride that must be yours to have laid so costly a sacrifice upon the altar of freedom. "Yours very sincerely, and respectfully, A. LINCOLN."
