Mc-Donald made the following announce-ment to the press: "I have just closed Donald made the following announce-ment to the press: "I have just closed the deal with William Murray of Butte Gity. Mr. Murray is in Holena and I have been talking to him there. The deal is closed which means Mr. Murray takes a lease on the fair ground's track. The races will follow the week's card to be run off during fair week, Oct. 5 to 10, inclusive. Mr. Murray tells me he will bring a long string of runners down with him as purses of \$1,00 will be hung up each day. The state fair will see more horses entered in the rac-fng program than ever before. Mr. Mur-ray saw a chance to hold a big meet be-cause of the number of animals being entered for the Utah fair card, and now that he has decided finally and definite-ly to conduct a 15-day meet the entries for the fair races are coming in with greater force than ever. Stable owners throughout the intermountain region see no reason for not getting in on the 20 days of racing-five, during the fair, and 16 immediately after. All the horses be-ing seen at the four-county fair now on moden, are to come to Sait Lake. The owners attending the big fair at Ogden told me they would come to Sait Lake.
