EASTERN DISPATCHES.

NEW YORK, 23.—New Brighton House, on State Street, was fired by lightning last night, and completely destroyed; loss \$40,000, insurance \$11,000.

The bank statement is unfavorable, and shows a loss of \$1,149,000.

The North-western corner continues to be the feature of the stock market to-day, and the excitement is unabated. The price fluctuated during the morning, from \$10 to \$12, when we report a large number of shorts settled at \$10, and indeed that all were allowed to settle except John H. Tracy. At this hour, 3 p.m., the prices have advanced to \$30.

CINCINNATI, 23.—The papers this morning report the suspension of W. H. Cattell of Martins, Ohio, very interested in iron and manufacturers of railroad building. It is claimed that there are ample assets to meet the liabilities.

NEW YORK, 23.—The steamer Gen. Sedgwick, from New Orleans, reports passing a lot of wrecked stuff with two dead bodies attached, in latitude 38, longitude 73.

BOSTON, 23.—The snow last night, the first of the season, extended over Maine and New Hampshire.

NEW YORK, 23.—Francis Martin, a cigar merchant, had a quarrel to-day with his wife at the door of the residence, 61st street, and discharged a pistol three times at the former, each shot taking effect, and one inflicting a fatal wound. Martin was arrested.

Forty-three hundred shares of North-western, bought two hundred cash, are reported to belong to D. Drew. It was bought under the rule for parties who refuse to settle.

The only suspension yet known is Trust & Co.

The Budget publishes several anonymous letters threatening Judge Dredge's life for his course in the trial of Laura D. Fair. They show that her friends are as bloodthirsty as herself.

OREGON, 23.—The Oregon City wooden mills were destroyed by fire this morning, supposed to be the work of an incendiary. One wooden building, occupied by a saloon, was taken down to save other buildings near by.

The loss is \$125,000. The assurance will cover about \$8,000. The books and papers were saved; also the wool-store house and its contents.

EUROPEAN.

PARIS, 23.—It is known that President Thiers endorses the plan lately proposed by the committee of the Left Centre, for the formation of a second chamber of the national legislature.

The government, however, did not accept the relations between the legislative and the executive departments of the government. As to the questions of the general policy in the internal affairs of the republic, Thiers adheres to the conservative ground taken in his recent message.

LONDON, 23.—Sir Jno. Bowring, British minister of Finance and editor of the Westminster Review, died yesterday.

MADRID, 23.—Rear Admiral Alden of the U. S. navy, yesterday reviewed the garrison of Madrid, and subsequently with a number of officers of the American squadron accompanied Minister of War on a visit to the engineer of the artillerists, and luncheon with the officers. Commemorative glasses were drunk and friendly sentiments exchanged. In the evening Gen. Siekies gave a dinner, which was attended by many Spaniards.

LONDON, 23.—O'Leary, one of the leaders of the recent Hyde Park demonstration in favor of the people of the Fenian cause, applied to Justice Quisen today for the withdrawal of the charge against him, which had been abandoned. O'Leary stated that he contemplated emigrating to America, where his prospects would be injured should the summons remain in existence, until he could be released in America for his acts here, but was more likely to be regarded as a martyr, and be the recipient of a public dinner and other honors.

Gales continue in the English Channel, and have been very destructive in the vicinity of Devonport. The transport steamer Himalaya had arrived there with a loss of eight of her crew.

PARIS, 23.—A bill providing for the restoration to the Orsay Museum of that property confiscated in '63, has had its second reading in the National Assembly.

The balances in the United States Treasury closed last evening \$6,800,000,000, and \$200,000,000 in gold and \$500 coin certificates, special deposit legal tenders for redemption of certificates of deposit \$23,505,000.

Since the adjournment of Congress, the President has made 127 appointments, for the interior departments 66, most of them in liaison agents and public land offices, department of justice 16, U. S. mint 10, post office 41, State department 21, of which 14 are consuls and most of the others continental commissioners. The last appointments need

not be confirmed by the Senate. For the Treasury department 34, of which 10 are superintendents of internal revenue under the new law. Most of the other appointments are for the internal revenue and custom departments.

A bill to be presented to Congress this winter proposes radical changes in the present working of the Supreme Court. The bill contemplates an intermediate court, which shall possess ordinary powers of the great Supreme Court and before which all cases shall be argued. The Supreme Court project to be made stationary and the judges to be relieved of all circuit duty, which will be performed by the judges of the intermediate court. The Supreme Court to give its entire attention to passing laws, and the intermediate court the trial of causes. The bill also provides that the intermediate court shall not construe law, but shall decide cases according to the construction placed upon the law by the Supreme Court.

NEW YORK.—Voght, who cannot be reached at his office, has been indicted for murder, in the absence of an extradition treaty, has applied for discharge from arrest.

The Italian emigrants, who were swindled in coming here, appealing they would be sent to Buenos Ayres, learned to their chagrin that many of them had sold their savings and thrown themselves upon the charities of their countrymen in this city. One died of destitution to-day. The Italian Vice Consul promised to have the master of their swindling investigated.
