

## AMERICAN STOCKS WEAK IN LONDON

In New York Opening Was Weak  
And Sharp Declines  
Shown.

### HILL SPURT INDUCED RALLY.

Did Not Hold Long and Market Continued to Give Way in Spots.

New York, Nov. 7.—American stocks in London were selling at wide discounts from Monday's prices here when trading began in New York. The opening was weak and some sharp declines were shown. Among the principal losses were Northern Pacific 2, Penna. 1, Interboro Metropolitan 1, Canadian Pacific 1, and Missouri Pacific, Union Pacific, St. Paul, L. & N., Baltimore and Ohio and U. S. Steel pfd., all declined about a point.

The market after numerous irregular fluctuations, finally settled to a lower basis. Fears of advance in the Bank of England discount rate was a feature in the weakness. Great Northern pfd., lost 2, Smeltling 1, Atchison, Northwestern and Steel 1. Pullman, on the other hand, moved up 1, Illinois Central, 1, and Pacific Mail 1.

A spurt in the Hill stocks induced a general rally which wiped out a large part of the declines. Later Reading declined 2, and carried the list back to a lower level than before. Northern Pacific's gain reached 2, Great Northern pfd. 3, Northwestern 2, Union Pacific and St. Paul 1, and Amalgamated Copper 1.

Bonds were heavy. The market continued to give way in spots, with weakness more noticeable in the industrials. Great Northern pfd., reacted 1, below Monday's closing, but the Hill stocks rallied again and steadied the general market. Anaconda yielded 2, Colorado Fuel and Smeltling 2.
