The former with a knife cut a deep wound on the latter. Both were taken to the hospital, Evans was at Pioche, under arrest, so says the Record.

THE GRIFFITHS TRAGEDY.—We are informed that but little hope is entertained of the recovery of Mrs. Griffiths who was shot yesterday by her husband. The unfortunate woman, however, does not suffer much pain, it being necessary to keep her under the influence of opiate.

This morning our reporter had an interview with the son of Griffiths, an intelligent lad about eighteen years of age, from whom the following information was gleaned. He stated that his father's age was fifty-eight years and that of his step-mother thirty-eight. She, the woman who was shot by her father, was the latter's third wife, his two previous wives having died. Griffiths was from Switzerland, South Wales, and he had been married for fifteen months. His son, our informant, and Mrs. Griffiths preceded him to this Territory, they having been here about three years. They had made some savings which jointly raised sufficient money to pay one half of Griffiths' fare from Wales to this country, and that was the way he was enabled to come here. He had given way to drink, but had been very temperate for several months prior to yesterday, when he perpetrated the hideous deed of blood which were recorded in our yesterday's issue. On the morning, however, he was seen drinking a little, but not so freely that its effects could be readily perceived on him.

Griffiths resided in the 15th Ward, and at the beginning of the present week he went to the law court to tell the witness who was employed by Mr. Samuel W. Richards, to call him a drunkard and a thief, as he did not want him there. He however accordingly called, took his clothes, bid him good-bye and left.

On Tuesday Griffiths returned, a pistol which he had brought with him to the City Hall by him as security for the payment of a fine which had been imposed on him for being drunk and abusing his wife. He afterwards went around the city in search of his son, but the latter kept out of his way.

He told the son he intended to kill him, and had offered money to different persons if they would tell him where the lad was. The warnings of Griffiths were received with alarm, and he left the city and go to Evansville.

He kept out of the way all day yesterday and was in complete ignorance of the fact that his father had killed his step-mother and himself. He told his son he had intelligence come to him while he was on the evening train for Orderville. The passenger had the speed of the train slackened and he jumped off and made his way to town, and on his arrival he learned the particulars of the affair.

The lad was deeply affected for his unfortunate step-mother, who he says is a most excellent woman. In speaking of her there was a tremor in his voice, and the tears welled up in his eyes. From the time he was born he had but little doubt that Griffiths intended not only to kill his wife, but also to do the same to him. He was determined this purpose and had to have most intent on its accomplishment.

INQUIRIES INVESTIGATED.

The following are the minutes of an inquest held in the City Hall, Salt Lake City, and County of Salt Lake, December 6, 1872, at 2 p.m., to inquire into the cause of the death of Griffith Griffiths, aged about 55 years. Coroner George J. Taylor presiding.

The following were duly examined and sworn as a Coroner's jury:

William C. Neal, M. B. Shipp and Frank Dewey.

J. W. Johnson was the first witness. His statement was, in effect, that while in the house on West Temple Street, in this city, about one o'clock on the day above mentioned, he saw a woman lying on the sidewalk, one woman, and on going outside he saw a woman lying on the sidewalk, another woman, and the woman was discharged once apparently accidentally, and the deceased then reached it raised it to his head and shot himself.

Alexander Purd was sworn, and identified the deceased as Griffith Griffiths.

William Paul, Jun., was next sworn, and was on West Temple Street, about eleven o'clock, when he heard screams and a report of firearms, and immediately afterwards saw three women running towards the building. He saw a woman fall, and the woman identified as the deceased, and the man who shot the woman and himself.

F. D. Hill was the next witness. He was on West Temple Street, when he saw three women running southward and a man after them. The latter was a few feet in rear of the last woman, whom he fired at and shot.

The man then tried to shoot himself, but seemed to fall in the first attempt, so, but finally shot himself through the hand. He had a pistol fired at him as the person who shot the woman and himself.

The deceased was identified as the person who shot the woman and himself.
