Most of the students in the academic and normal departments have been pursuing definite courses of study, with a view to graduation. Of these, sixteen have completed with success the junior course in normal training, and have passed all the examinations required in the same. They have in consequence received certificates this day as teachers in the primary grades of the Church School service.

Two students of the academic department have taken certificates of gradu-ation in the course in natural science; one in the course of domestic science; two in business courses, and two in

phonography.

Normal students have been admitted free of charge to the extent of the Church appropriation of means for such purpose Each applicant for admission under such appropriation has been required to make a written declaration of his intentions and purpose in seeking normal training, together with a promise to remain, except product unavoidable circumstances, to the under unavoidable circumstances, to the close of the course, or to his successful graduation.

This being the first year of normal work in this institution, little has been attempted beside the branches of the ordinary curriculum, outside the theory and practice of teaching and object les-sons. We have sadly felt the need of more ample accommodations and facili-ties for this special and important department of our work, and we confidently hope for improved conditions at the opening of another year.

OUR THEOLOGICAL ORGANIZATION

has continued in full force and operation. As heretofore, this very important feature of Church school work has received full consideration at our hands. Daily class exercises have been held in each department on the cardinal principles of the Latter-day Saints' faith, the standard works of the Church baving been used as

text books. Testimony meetings, priesthood meetings, general theological classes, and monthly fast-day moetings have been held regularly, according to the conditions of my previous reports to you. As during the greater part of the preceding year, we have been favored during both terms of the fifth academic year with valuable aid from Elder George Reynolds, who has conducted the academic class in Book of Mormon study. Our daily sessions of college exercises have been, without exception, opened and closed with singing and prayer.

### THE SINGING

the singing has been under the direction of Instructor Evan Stephens, and we cannot express other than sincere pleasure and satisfaction at the success that has attended the course. The instructor has practically demonstrated the wisdom of training the many rather than the few, even if the general attainment in artistic shilting the somewhat lower than would ability be somewhat lower than would otherwise be the case. With this object in view we have refrained from organ-izing any choir for general service, all the devotional singing having been carried on by the whole congregation of assembled students. During the whole year Brother Clare W. Reid of the Normal department has acted as our efficient organist. According to
