The remains were brought to this city this noon, and notice of the funeral will be given later. Mrs. Wilkes was a native of southern Ohio, and was married to the major in 1854. They returned to Utah in 1871 and resided in Salt Lake, where they resided ever since. Their golden wedding was celebrated two years ago at the residence of the daughter's family.

GENERAL WITCHER CROSSES DIVIDE

Many Friends Mourn Loss of
Soldier of Stanch Patriotism.

SPLENDID ARMY RECORD.

From First Lieutenant His Meritorious
Services Earned for Him Distinction
—Was in Shenandoah Campaign.

Brigadier General John S. Witcher, the well known retired army paymaster, died yesterday at 5:30 p. m., at his residence, Fifth East street. He had not been in good health for some time, but it was not until recently that he became incapacitated. His departure while not unexpected, will be regretted by many friends who admired the old soldier's staunch patriotism and earnest character.

Gen. Witcher was born July 15, 1859, in that part of old Virginia that afterward became West Virginia, and was commissioned in December, 1882, as a first lieutenant in the Third West Virginia cavalry. He was made a captain in September, 1883; a major in the May following; a lieutenant colonel in May, 1885, and was mustered out in June 1891 for meritorious services in the Shenandoah campaign and the final operations around Richmond. After the war, Gen. Witcher engaged in farming, and was elected to the Fifty-first Congress from West Virginia. Army life, however, had its attractions, and Gen. Witcher accepted a commission as paymaster in the regular service, with rank of major, in August, 1890. He was retired in 1899, and promoted in April, 1901, in accordance with an act of Congress to be lieutenant colonel retired, the retirement being at his own request on the ground that he was the father of the late Dr. Witcher, who was very much esteemed in this city, particularly because of his generous and disinterested enthusiasm in his profession.

Gen. Witcher is survived by his wife, one daughter and four sons. His children are Mrs. Francis McCullough of Huntington, W. Va.; William V. Witcher of Oakland, Cal.; P. S. Witcher of Granger, Arthur B. Witcher of this city, and Edwin J. Witcher, who is in Alaska.

BULLOCK'S FATE KNOWN AT LAST

Body of Young Quarryman Rises
To Surface of Jordan
River.

HE DISAPPEARED IN APRIL.

It Proves to Be That of
Victim.

The fate of James M. Bullock, the young quarryman who disappeared about the middle of last April, and for whom a constant search was made by relatives and the police, is no longer a mystery. The semi-decomposed remains of the young man were fished out of the Jordan river yesterday morning by John Graham and a friend who were fishing. The police were at once notified, and the patrol wagon with Sergeant Hemple and Officer Hilton, hurried to the scene and took the body to Evans' undertaking establishment. The body was identified as that of Bullock.

Whether or not Bullock's death was due to accident or suicide may never be known, but there is reason for believing the latter. On April 13, Detective Shannon saw the young man near the river and as he acted strangely, Shannon placed him under arrest and took him to the station. Bullock declared he was not drunk and was permitted to go. He was never seen again alive. On the 20th of April Michael Garvin found a hat on the banks of the Jordan. A note in the hat said: "I am dead. I am dead." The hat was identified as that belonging to Bullock, and efforts were then made to find the body in the stream which has claimed so many victims. The bed of the river was dragged and dynamite was used in the hope of bringing the body to the surface, but without success.

Yesterday morning while fishing Graham's hook caught on what he supposed was a snag. But when he pulled he found there was not much resistance, and was greatly surprised when he saw a dead body come to the surface. The police were then notified and took charge of the body.

Funeral services over the remains were held at the cemetery at 11 o'clock this morning. No indoor services were held owing to the condition of the body.

Bullock was the son of James Bullock of 1879 south Eleventh east street. The unfortunate man was 22 years of age at the time of his death.
