DEPEN AT CHICAGO.

Chaney's Mr. Depen Speaks to an

Audience of 2000, the World's

Fair.

CHICAGO, June 5.—An audience

of probably 2000 persons gathered at

the Auditorium tonight to listen to

speech by Chaney's Mr. Depen of

New York, the noted author of

the "World's Fair," the occasion being

the annual address of the Press Club.

The speech, which was interesting

and punctuated with witty points,

was greeted with great applause by

the audience. The subject spoke as follows:

received the invitation of the Press

Club to deliver this address to-night,

I supposed that it would be a free

and easy chat from a layman upon

journalism. It is the peculiarity

profession or trades that on their

commemorative occasions they desire

to have some one who knows

intimately the history and the

business of their industry.

I have seen that this year
