SHEPHERD ON TRIAL FOR LIBEL.

Preliminary Hearing Before Judge Rhees of Pleasant View.

RAWLINSON-SCOVILLE WEDDING.

Frank Pingree Home—James Riley Suffers Broken Leg—Wm. Smith Convicted of Grand Larceny.

The criminal libel suit against J. J. Shepherd was commenced yesterday morning at 11:30 before Justice Rhees, of Pleasant View, the case having been transferred to that court on a change of venue from the Ogden municipal court, at the request of the defendant.

County Attorney Hulaniski was present to conduct the case for the state and M. D. Lesinger appeared for Shepherd. The testimony of the prosecution was completed and the defense put several witnesses on the stand before the court adjourned last evening, until this morning at 10 o'clock. About witnesses who were subpoenaed to testify in the case failed to put in an appearance yesterday and the court postponed this morning were issued and placed in the hands of the sheriff to be served.

The first libel suit that was filed by Detective James F. Pender was against Shepherd, known as the "Daily News," which stated in part that the detective is a "friendly" and protector of the "Tophams" in various offenses, and law breakings.

Thomas Bradley testified that he printed the "Daily News" for Shepherd. Charles Nelson testified to receiving the paper in the alleged libelous article appeared.

O. H. Butler, the young man who passed the papers for Shepherd testified to that fact and identified the evidence had been introduced in evidence as similar to the papers he had passed.

City Recorder Critchlow testified to the appointment of Mr. Pender as chief of police. This completed the evidence for the prosecution and the defense put Chief of Police Browning, David Jansen, Alex Larson and Peter Poulson on the stand, who were called upon to prove that gambling was permitted in Ogden, but as the subject was foreign from the one being tried, on motion of County Attorney Hulaniski it was stricken from the case and the case was completed it is understood, the other charge preferred against him by Detective Pender and the one brought by the mayor will be tried.

DEATH OF MRS. HANNAH WEBB

Veteran and Pioneer of 73—Funeral of John Mason. Special Correspondence.

Lehi, Utah Co., April 26.—Mrs. Hannah G. Webb, wife of John Webb, died here Sunday, April 24. She was born May 9, 1831, in Bedfordshire, England, and was 72 years, 11 months and 14 days old at the time of her death. She received the Gospel in her native land in 1846, and came to Lehi with her husband in 1854. She was the mother of five sons and three daughters. Four children, 30 grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild survive her. She passed through many trying ordeals in the course of her life, but bore every trial with hopeful fortitude.

IMPROVE STREETS AND PARK

Missionary Benefit—Farmers More Hopeful Since Recent Storms. Special Correspondence.

Manti, Sanpete Co., April 26.—The city fathers of Manti are showing commendable energy in the direction of making this city beautiful and an attractive place for the home-seeker. The flood problem which has for years been a source of much concern to the people, and the cause of heavy expense almost every year, apparently has been solved. Work done in the mouth of the canyon last year kept the high waters backed up during the flush season so that in summer no damage was done along the channel through the city. Then with the grading of some of the streets and the establishing of paving districts came good sidewalks and roads, some of which have been completed. The work has been done, and all tending to the comfort and convenience of the inhabitants. Considerable of an outlay is this year being made by the city in making a public park. Plans

have been submitted and accepted for the laying out of grounds just below the temple, and work has already commenced. The plans call for the planting of a great many hardwood and evergreen trees, the making of grass plots, flowerbeds, etc. Pipes have been extended from the mains conveying water from the city waterworks to the park and through it to the cemetery immediately below. When completed it will be "a thing of beauty and a joy forever." Just above stands the temple in all its majestic grandeur, at the foot of which lies the city of the dead, every grave nestling under the cool shade of the trees, making the hallowed spot where repose our departed kindred and friends a place of inspiration. Manti is one of the pioneer cities of the Intermountain country, and is destined soon to be one of the most beautiful.
