DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

The People's Party struggling for supremacy of constitutional law and vention adjourned until 10 c'clock the sacred privilege of local self-government, submit the following declaration of principles:

1st. We believe that the protection of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness is the object of free government, and that the Constitution of the United States was ordained and established to secure the greatest possible liberty to man, woman and child, consistent with the public welfare.

2nd. We believe that free government can only exist where the people governed participate in the administration thereof.
